KILLED TO DEATH.
LOWELL, Mass., 12.—Mrs. Dunn, the wife of a laborer in this city, was kicked to death this p.m. by her husband, who wanted money from her, but was refused; Dunn is under arrest.

WESTERN.

News From the Navigator Islands.
SAN FRANCISCO, 13.—A Bulletin letter from the Navigator Islands says that Colonel Steinberger, U.S. Commissioner, was cordially received by the natives who adopted a constitution framed by Steinberger, making the monarchy elective for a term of four years to alternate between the two old families of kings, Malietoa and Tupou, a royal prince of the former family was elected the first king. Colonel Steinberger was chosen prime minister for life, and accepted the position.

GREAT BRITAIN.
Speech by the Canadian Premier.

LONDON, 13.—Mackenzie, the Canadian Premier, in a speech at Dundee last night referred to the great resources of Canada. He contended that it was quite competent for two nations to rule on the North American continent, governed differently and with differing political institutions, and he was convinced that so long as Great Britain maintained her present attitude towards the colonies' friendship and confidence would be maintained.

The Moody and Sankey Meetings.
The following is the number of meetings held by Moody and Sankey in London during the past four months, with their aggregate attendance and amount of collections, attended by 40,000 people. Victoria Theatre, 45 meetings, attended by 40,000; in the Opera House, 50 meetings, attended by 30,000; in Bow, 60 meetings, attended by 60,000; and in Agricultural Hall, 60 meetings, attended by 70,000. The amount of money expended for building, printing, stews, etc., is \$10,000; Moody and Sankey decline to receive any compensation from the committee.

The Grain Market.
The *Miner* Lane Express, in its weekly review, says the crops have been good, and the reports made to this effect have produced a quiet feeling in the London grain market, where orders had begun to advance, but there has been a further improvement in country prices, there being in many places an advance of one to two shillings for wheat, and as the idea of having a crop last year is given up, and stocks down, there is plenty of room for a further rise. In France the damage to crops from floods has been very extensive in the provinces, and figures show a rise in wheat from one to two shillings.

Cup to be Shot For.
The Council of the British National Rifle Association, at a meeting to-day, adopted a resolution that the New York Rifle Association be invited to accept a challenge cup to compete for in 1876 at Wimbleton, by the Americans, the winner to hold the cup until the next meeting of the New York Association, when he is to hand it over to the council of that Association. In order that it may be compensated for them, and annually there after for \$1,000, on conditions to be determined by the New York Association.

Feasting the Americans.

EDINBURGH, 13.—The American Ambassador and his wife, William Nelson, a leading citizen of Edinburgh, gave them a banquet to-night, in the course of which he made a speech waxing in eulogy of America. Gildersleeve responded in fitting terms. The members of the team leave for London to-morrow.

FRANCE.
Election Annulled—Speech by Gambier.

VERSAILLES, 12.—The Assembly, to-day, declared the election of M. Bourgois, in the Department of Nievre, null and void, by a vote of 330 to 310 nays. The ministers were questioned in regard to their conduct towards the Bonapartists, when M. Rouher made his expected speech.
