

more advanced and everything is growing very fast. Peaches, apricots, cherries, etc., are in bloom, and lucern is a foot high; garden stuff is up and most of the spring seedling is about finished. In a few districts of the central and western sections of the State the soil is reported "crusted" on account of the heat and dry weather, rendering irrigation necessary to bring up the late grain. The majority of correspondents report that the outlook for a good crop of fruit is very encouraging.

**Garland**—Past week favorable to work and growth of vegetation; wheat is looking nicely and rooting well; ground is beginning to bake making it difficult for grain that is not up to get through it.

**Portage**—Warm and splendid weather for growth of vegetation. Grass and wheat growing nicely; farmers plowing and sowing in earnest.

**West Portage**—Fine spring weather last four days of week. Farmers busy plowing and sowing. Grass and lucern begin to color the ground; winter wheat has stood the winter well; spring wheat is being sown; orchards and shade trees begin to show their leaf buds.

**Geneva**—Six inches of snow on the fields yet. Unless we have very favorable weather it will be twelve or fourteen days before farming will commence here.

**Doveyville**—Winter wheat is doing well; lucern fields and meadows are beginning to look green; farmers busy plowing and putting in spring wheat and barley.

**Brigham City**—We have had very fine weather for all kinds of farm labor, and much has been done during the week; lucern, pastures and meadows doing fine.

**Collinston**—Past week has been favorable to all farm work and to the growth of vegetation; wheat stood well and is well rooted; soil in prime condition; farming and gardening commenced; crops are most promising and will be good if Jack Frost keeps away.

**Honeyville**—Weather has been fine and all kinds of vegetation made noticeable progress during the week; fruit buds swelling and gooseberry bushes leafing out; garden stuff about all in; soil in good condition for plowing.

**Logan**—Snow is all gone; ground very wet; a little gardening has been done.

**Mendou**—Very warm; snow going very fast, water nearly all going into the ground; much snow in the hills in this vicinity; gardening will begin next week; ground in good condition.

**Providence**—Weather exceedingly fine; gardening and seedling commenced.

**Hyde Park**—Snow gone; frosty nights; winter wheat in fine condition; no spring work commenced yet, but the ground is in good condition.

**Smithfield**—Favorable spring weather during past week; snow all gone from farm lands; gardening commenced; grain and lucern doing well; high waters already begun and indications are that some damage will occur.

**Benson**—The weather has been fine during the past week; snow has all disappeared and the ground is drying up very fast.

**Millville**—Clear and pleasant weather during the whole week; snow about all gone.

**Lewiston**—Favorable weather during past week; snow about all gone; winter wheat looks fine and has grown two inches high under the snow; the country is flooded with water which will delay farming eight or ten days.

**Huntsville**—In the bulletin of the 13th, Huntsville was reported with two inches of snow, it should have been two feet; there is yet about six inches of snow on the ground.

**Utah**—Since the 12th the sun has been shining; snow is gone; plowing is going on everywhere; spring wheat and lucern are sown as fast as possible; gardening commenced in good shape; peas, cabbage, turnips and radishes are all up. The Weber river is getting high; there will be trouble with the bridges and riparian farms.

**Plain City**—The warm days that have just come upon us make the farmers hustle with their plowing to get in their grain and garden crops.

**Scipio**—A very fine week. Most of the small grain sown. Farmers busy and prospects fine.

**Meadow**—Fine warm weather all the week. All crops in except potatoes and corn; lucern well advanced and promising more than average crop.

**Hickley**—The past week has been favorable for all farm work. Farmers busy putting in crops; watering commenced; soil in good condition.

**Deseret**—Past week very favorable for farm work; plowing and seeding going on; lucern, which is our main crop, growing fine; gardening is being pushed and watering commenced; fruit buds are bursting and everything seems favorable for good crops. The Sevier river has fallen two feet. Arbor day was observed by a great many planting trees.

**Chester**—The weather has been delightful for farming purposes. A broader area of land is being placed under cultivation. The buoyancy of this place with its four reservoirs is evident all around.

**Fountain Green**—The past week warm. Most of small grain in; grass and lucern growing nicely.

**Spring City**—Favorable weather and soil in good condition; farmers busy putting in crops; a great amount of wheat has been seeded and the gardens also have received attention; alfalfa beginning to appear green; winter wheat in sight looks promising.

**Manti**—The past week has been excellent for the farmer and all of the small grain is in. All that is needed now is a nice gentle rain to insure a good stand of grain. Vegetation of all kinds is starting with better promise than a year ago.

**Ephraim**—Past week has been favorable to all farm work and growth of vegetation. Most of the grain has been sown, and the prospects are very good for a prosperous season. The soil is in good condition; trees and plants are doing well.

**Mount Pleasant**—The weather for the past week has been fine and most excellent for farm work. Farmers busy in putting in crops. The fruit crop promises excellent returns if the weather continues.

**Moroni**—The weather of the past

week has been warm and dry with light frost at nights. Farm work general; most of the wheat sown.

**Miller**—Past week dry and warm. Farmers busy in putting in grain; water rising fast; everything begins to look green; lucern starting good.

**Halliday**—A very fine dry warm week. Apricots ready to bloom. Farmers all busy putting in crops. Lucern growing nicely; water rising fast.

**Mill Creek**—The warm weather of the past week has been much in favor of farm work. More than half of the grain is in and some is starting to come up; lucern is growing fine; water is rising rapidly, and fruit buds not killed by frost are ready to burst.

**Kingston**—A very favorable week for farming but rather dry; grass keeps growing slowly; river rose only one-half inch past week.

**Circleville**—The past week has been favorable for putting in crops.

**American Fork**—Past week has been very fine and warm; small grain on the bench land looks very dry, but bottom land is about right for working. Considerable is now being done in making canals and water ditches to prepare for high water.

**Lake View**—Peas, radishes and turnips coming up; lucern commencing to grow good; sugar beets are being planted; peach buds are making good appearance; a good rain needed.

**Lake Shore**—Past week very favorable for farming; the grain crop will soon be all seeded; fall grain is looking green; lucern commencing to grow.

**Salem**—Past week very favorable to farm work and growth of vegetation. The wheat and oats about all in the ground; gardening under good headway; many fruit and shade trees planted during the week.

**Mapleton**—Past week favorable for all kinds of farm work; soil in prime condition; sugar beet planting in progress; lucern crop promises to be large as very little winter killed.

**Spanish Fork**—A very fine week; small grain all in except a few late lands; ground drying very fast, and beet ground will either have to have a storm or be irrigated before planting.

**Ferron**—Past week very favorable to all farm work and growth of vegetation; farmers are seeding very fast; lucern is beginning to show quite green.

**Lawrence**—The work of putting in spring crops is progressing rapidly; considerable frost yet in the ground.

**Green River**—The past week has been more favorable to all farm work and to the growth of vegetation; apricots in full bloom; wheat, oats and lucern growing fast.

**Tooele**—An ideal farming week; all small grain about in, but will need rain to bring the last seeded up. The lucern shows the effects of the week's good weather.

**Center**—The change has come and it is summer all at once; farming operations progressing rapidly.

**Rockport**—Weather warm; snow most all gone; small streams full; no farming done yet as land is too wet.

**Oakley**—Snow about gone and farmers expect to begin plowing soon; no grain sown yet.

**Peoa**—Snow going fast; too wet for plowing.
