Utah Ranks High at the University of Pennsylvania.

SOME GOOD MATERIAL HERE.

Field from Which to Draw Young Men for Higher Education—Students in Attendance Now.

University of Pennsylvania, Dec. 13.  
Utah ranks high at the University of Pennsylvania as a field from which to draw young men for higher education. In 1903 there were but two Utah students here. Since then the number has rapidly increased until now there are 14 registered. The Utah boys boast of the fact that not only does Utah, in proportion to her population, send more students to Pennsylvania than any state in the Union except the state in which the college is located, Delaware, and New Jersey, but also that Utah has more representatives in actual numbers than any one of 34 other states.

Last year, in order to promote a good social feeling between the fellows and to bring the University of Pennsylvania in closer contact with Utah and her sons, the Utah State club was organized. In October of this year the club was reorganized with the following officers: President, C. W. Richards, re-elected; vice president, Dale Parke; treasurer, Earl Greenwood; secretary, Dan Alexander.

## IMPORTANT ORGANIZATION.

Some idea of the importance of the organization can be gathered from the fact that at the two monthly meetings held this year the vice president of the college, Edgar F. Smith, talked to the boys at the first, and Dean Kirke of the dental college addressed them at the second. The following men are registered at Penn this year: Calvin W. Richards from Orangeville is a senior in the dental department; Earl Greenwood and William S. Paine, both from Ogden, are second-year men in the same department; Walter D. Thomas, also from Ogden, is a first-year man in the same course. In the law department there are three men: Dale Parke, who last year captained the debating team which defeated Columbia; Dan Alexander, who made the debating team which defeated Cornell last year, and W. H. Bowler Jr., from Ogden. Dr. H. A. Anderson from Provo, who is doing post graduate work; Robert Alexander, a first-year man, and Julian Hardy of

## Who for Four Years Has Made Utah's Football Famous.

Football at the University of Utah is of a quality now that is not surpassed in the intermountain west. Leading this section in all else, Utah is now distinctly the center of football interest, and skill in the game.

Four years ago, when Maddock came, the team was picked up for practice games. This year the Los Angeles team which defeated Utah took it as the prize capture of the season, and in the intermountain section Utah was so easily superior over Denver, Colorado College, and Golden that the title of intermountain champion rests in Utah without serious dispute. The Colorado School of Mines, which Utah defeated with ease, is Colorado champion.

In Maddock's first season Utah became acquainted with "hurry-up" methods, and won over every team encountered, except Boulder, which was met the first week Maddock was here. The next year the season was going splendidly until Boulder was met, and here the high Colorado atmosphere crippled the team, as it has all teams which have journeyed to Boulder in hope of victory. ## CHICAGO SOCIETY LEADERS.

As "Living Music" Will Take Part in A Unique Pantomime

Chicago, Dec. 14.—As "living music," leaders in Chicago society will take part in a unique series of pantomimes at Orchestra hall, Jan. 1 and 8. Dramatic representations of four elaborate musical compositions will be portrayed on the stage, and the Thomas orchestra giving the accompaniments. Upwards of a hundred persons will appear in the several scenes, which for richness of setting, it is said, will eclipse anything of the kind ever attempted before in Chicago.

One musical pantomime, "Jack Frost," the stage setting of which is an ideal Italian garden, never has been given before, and another, "Erinyes," an adaptation from an old Greek tragedy, set to music written by Massenet, has been given only once on the stage. That was in Paris in 1899, when it was given for a week, and proved the sensation of a season in the French capital. 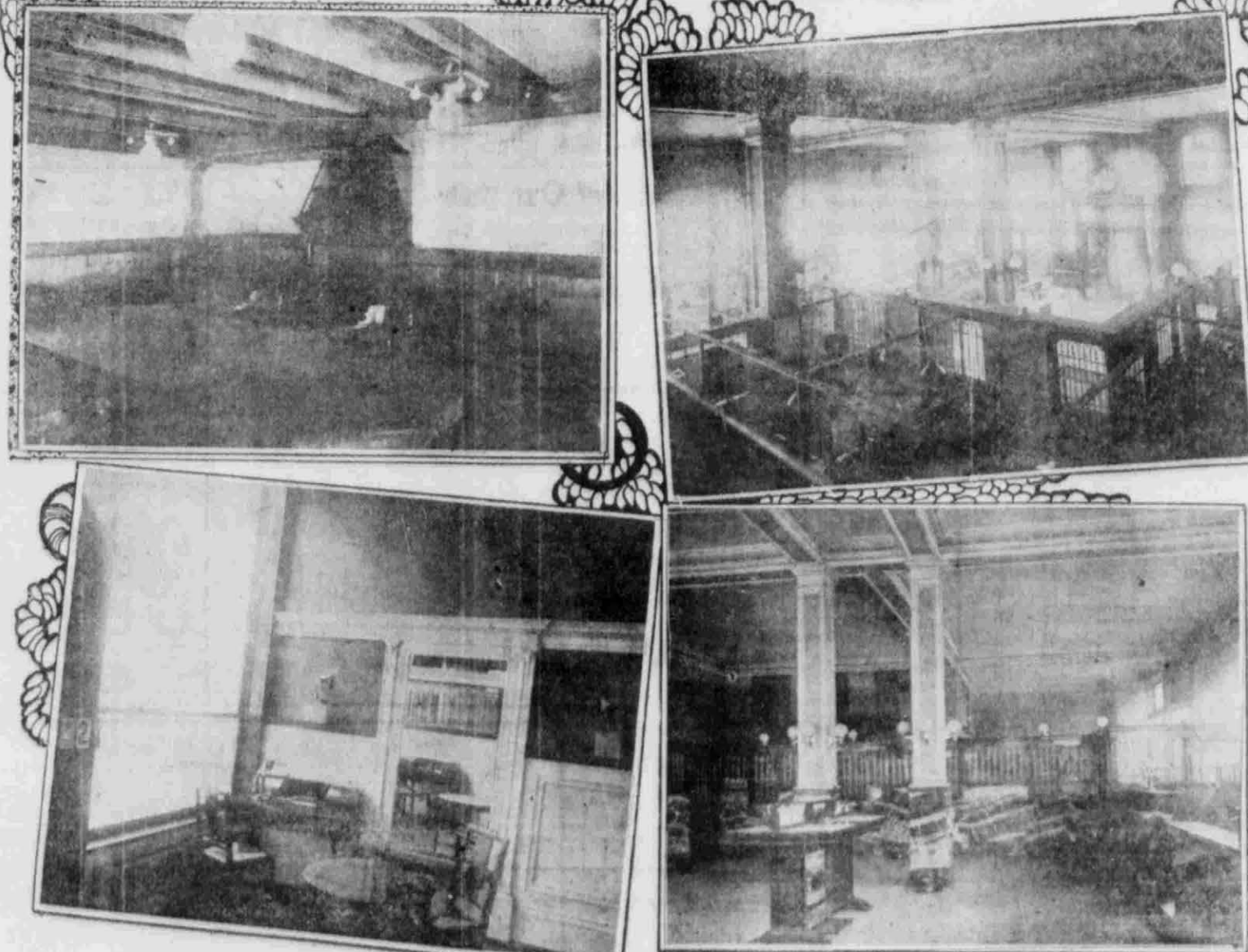
