SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 10.—Two Senators

were added to the committee on the

Mississippi levee.

Mr. Johnson offered a resolution

directing the committee on pensions to

report a bill granting pensions to

soldiers of the war of 1812, their

widows and orphans, and said he

would call it up on the 30th inst.

Matthews offered an amendment

to the bill to repeal the resumption

Star, North Deutsche Zeitung,

permitted to remain neutral in an

Anglo-Russian war. If Russia allies

herself with Russia she will have

to give up Constantinople as a

pledge of her fidelity. If she sides

with England, Constantinople, Gallipoli, Smyrna and the Euro-

pean shore of the Bosphorus and the

Dardanelles will be occupied

by Russian troops at any risk. The

Russian fortifications around Con-

stantinople render the conquest of

the city certain, and the Russian

torpedoes will soon teach England's

navy to keep at a distance, lest a

return to Bosphorus should be cut

off."

It is announced that a review

of 20,000 Turkish troops will be

held near Constantinople on

Thursday.

It is stated that Hobart Pasha

has obtained a short leave of ab-

sence, for the purpose of visiting

England.
