## BREWERS TO WAGE WAR ON SALOONS

Association Will Attempt to Put to Rout the Low Dive.

CAMPAIGN WELL OUTLINED.

Revocation and Denial of License to Be the Weapons With Which the Fight Will be Carried On.

One result of the surging of the temperance wave from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast is seen in the attitude now assumed by the brewers of the country. The United States Brewers' association, in which nearly every brewer of consequence in the country is enrolled as a member, is to wage war upon the low dive and evil-breeding saloon. It will press prosecution and will insist upon revocation and denial of license to such resorts. This information is contained in a letter received from Warren B. Bullock, allied with the publicity department of the United States Brewers' association. It is offered for publication free of charge as the association is to circulate throughout the country to afford circulation for the story.

The sort of dive and low saloon to be aimed at is the one that has recently been so much talked about in its full meaning. Publications leading in the fight for temperance have told actual happenings which have occurred in these resorts—not all of them frequent, but some of them embellished with costly fronts, adorned with elaborate frescoes and decorated with pictures by renowned artists, which forbid mention. With the articles leading the attack upon this source of crime and breeding place for crime, have been presented photographs which tell in indisputable language of actual and existing circumstances. It is the saloon where lotteries is permitted, where crimes are hatched by criminals, and where the law is in the standards of the criminal profession. It is the saloon where the owners permit women to congregate. It is, too, the saloon which invites the lawless to all vices, and where they drink and thereby to bring upon his family suffering and privation. It is against such that the fight is to be waged.

The well-outlined campaign is to be brought to the point of assault when the brewers meet in their annual convention. The fight is to be taken up against those who are engaged in the business of operating saloons may take upon itself more than is not objectionable and commend itself to the public rather than to be regarded as the evil which is now undisputed.

**THE BREWERS' STORY.** The Bullock story is as follows: "The United States Brewers' association to be elevated, the dive and disreputable saloon eradicated, and this by action of the brewers of the nation, according to the plan for the coming year, the United States Brewers' association to be held in Milwaukee June 8 to 10. This association includes practically every brewer of consequence in the country and the country is almost unanimous for the reform of the saloon. The national campaign for the eradication of the dive is the result of the success of the movement which has been undertaken in the sports way in various parts of the country. In Wisconsin, Minnesota, New York and many other states efforts for the elevation of the standard of the saloon have been made. The saloon has been marked degree, and those who have backed this reformation in various states now propose to make the movement national instead of a state campaign only.

This course has resulted from a realization by the brewing companies that the worst enemies of the industry are those in their own ranks who have tolerated the law-defying and disorderly element in the saloon in the saloon business. For some years past efforts have been made in some localities to rid the saloon business of this element and make the saloon a respectable business, generally recognized as such. The anti-saloon movement has caused this realization that the evils of the trade are not necessarily a part of the trade, but are due to the lawless element, the disorderly, law-breaking saloon men.

**SUCCESS IN OTHER FIGHTS.** The national movement will be urged as a result of the success of the similar movement in various states. In Massachusetts and Pennsylvania the enactment of wise laws has wiped out the saloon business. In the latter state the brewers themselves leading in the securing of proper laws. In some states the laws themselves have stimulated over-competition, which has resulted in the decay of the saloon business. The brewers realize that organized war must be done to eliminate this element, and through individual efforts have done much to wipe out the saloon business. It has been decided to get all of the nation's brewers working together as a unit for this end. The Texas brewers found great success in their fight against the saloon. The movement is now being taken up by the committee of 14 organized to regulate the saloon law, and with the aid of the bonding companies which bond the licensees, it is expected to put about 150 disorderly places out of business, as a result of inability to secure licenses.

The same course has been adopted in Buffalo, Syracuse, Rochester and other New York state cities. The West Virginia brewers have united to force the disreputable resort out of business. In New York they have taken to the retailers insisting upon rigid compliance with the laws. The same step has been taken by the New Jersey and Ohio brewers, as well as by the Minnesota brewers in the west.

In Milwaukee the brewers have taken a similar course. They are prosecuting violators of the law by insisting upon the revocation of the licenses by the city council. As a result of this movement it is expected that a wholesale house cleaning will take place in every city of consequence in the country.
