# FELKNER CASE.

#### J. E. Dooly's Action in Norton Estate To be Re-Aired in Court.

The supreme court this afternoon reversed the judgment of the lower court in the celebrated case of William H. Felkner et al appellants, against John E. Dooly, and remanded the case for a retrial. The action was brought to compel Dooly to account for funds received by him as executor of the will of William A. Norton, deceased received from the sale of the Charles Dickens' mining property located in Idaho. Dooly held a mortgage on the property and foreclosed the same and the property was sold to R. C. Chambers as trustee for Mr. Dooly. Immediately after the time for redemption had expired Dooly sold the property to an English syndicate for \$150,000, his claim against the property amounting to about \$25,000. The plaintiff sought him to account to the estate for the balance of the sale price. In the lower court the complaint was dismissed as being barred by the statute of limitations. This judgment is reversed by the opinion of the supreme court.

## AGAINST BULL FIGHT.

#### Mayor Morris Vetoes Measure Providing for Spanish Sport in Salt Lake.

Mayor Morris today vetoed the license granted by the city council to allow an exhibition of bullfighting by Senor Enrique Robles on March 17 at the Salt Palace.

In doing so the mayor said that he did not object to that part of the peti. tion of the management referring to "broncho riding" or "rope throwing:" nor had the executive any scruples against Held's band discoursing music. But of the "builfight" portion of the petition, he said: "I cannot approve it. as it is in direct conflict with section 4454 of the Revised States of Utah, 1898, which reads as follows: "Any person who shall keep or use

any bull, bear, dog, cock or other ani-mal, fowl or bird, for the purpose of fighting or baiting, and any person who shall be a party to or be present as a spectator at any such fighting or baiting, or any bear, bull, dog, cock, or other animal, fowl or bird, and any person who shall rent any building, shed, room, yard, ground, or premises for the purpose of fighting or baiting any animal, fowl, or bird, as aforesaid, or shall knowingly suffer or permit the use of any building, shed, room, yard ground, or premises belonging to him or under his control, for either or any of the purposes aforesaid, shall, on convic-tion thereof, be adjudged guilty of a misdemeanor."
