EUREKA. MINER FALLS THIRTY FEET.

James Campbell, Foreman of Eureka Hill, Seriously Injured.

Eureka, Juab Co., Aug. 8 .- James Campbell, foreman of the Eureka Hill mine, fell a distance of about thirty feet in the underground workings of the mine this afternoon at 4 o'clock and received injuries that may cause his death, Mr. Campbell was walking through a stope Campbell was walking through a stope on the 700-foot level, in company with Gus Berg, another miner, when he stepped on a piece of timber which broke and let him fall.
