New York has a Chinese school.
 An East India inventor has found how to make gas out of street dirt and sewage.
 The oldest paper in America is the "New Hampshire Gazette," established October 5th, 1750.

 A French chemist proposes to phosphorize door numbers so that they will shine at night.
 A perfectly petrified corpse, having the appearance of a cast in marble, was removed from a Portland cemetery last week.
 Alderman Glackmeyer, of London, Canada, charged \$2,500, for two days board and lodging for George Arthur.

 It is reported in Wall Street that James Fisk, Jr., made \$9,000,000 on Friday, the 24th ult., the first day of the star gamblers.
 The star Tau Coronae has disappeared. Observers are wondering whether it has been burnt out, or by increase of distance has passed from the limit of vision of earthly astronomers.

Four Jews are now English Barons—Sir Francis Goldsmid, Sir Moses Montefiore, Sir Anthony Rothschild, and Sir David Solomon—all of whom have been made such within thirty years.
 The last miracle from the skies is the falling of a sheet of ice, about twelve feet square and thicker than an ordinary pane of glass, during a rain storm at Dublin, Ind.
