VIGOROUS ATTACKS FROM TWO PULPITS

Ministers Arraign Party of Broken Promises and Renounce Their Support.

SLOT MACHINES ARE EXAMPLE

"We Need the Money," Otherwise Known as "Americanites," Weak Excuse Offered by Bosses.

Because of the operation of a city's government for look instead of for the city's good, and because of the effort to fasten the "American" party campaign barrel so firmly to the city treasury that the public money will carry the expense of keeping the party in power, an undertone of serious complaint is arising, and it is entirely outside of the circles in which opposition to the "American" party as a party has centered.

In two of the city's churches yesterday congregations listened to arraignments of the spoils system in government, and the warning that retribution soon must follow upon disloyalty, as Rev. E. L. Goshen put it of others: "They have got us to their manhood, and to their God."

The police department, which confessedly is wrecked on the justification that what has occurred is 'politics,' the fact that the city is paying for the training of green firemen, while old and experienced men with long and faithful records are turning to other avocations, and the like, the public treasury has many barks that keep it empty beyond all hope of the income to gain on them, are what cause the present outburst of protest,

REV. E. L. GOSHEN.

"Be ye faithful, even unto death," was the Rev. E. L. Goshen's opening sentiment at the First Congregational church. And, he continued, while speaking of examples of disloyalty, "I am not going out of my own city to find them."

The sermon was preached to a large assembly of people and before he had finished the Rev. Mr. Goshen had promised at future meeting to handle the theme in a more specific manner giving dates and details.

"There are men in the city service," he said, "whom I regard with the highest respect and there are others in the city for whom I have nothing but contempt, men who are abusing themselves for petty gains and are not faithful to their oath, to their manhood, nor to their God." He prophesied for them the fruitless dislocations in the course of ruined sons and the lasting condemnation of their followers.

"Disloyalty to the home," he said, "makes shipwreck of lives, disloyalty to the pulpit makes a religion a mockery, disloyalty to the few makes the pulpit fall."

Manhood with loyalty for its inspiration was eulogized as the highest form of virtue, while disloyalty, Arnold was instances, was an example of a traitor cannot live and win, for he sold his loyalty at too low a figure, and reaped a dishonored name in history as the result.

Further, he said, "Loyalty to the laws of music made Beethoven fill the world with beauty; Loyalty to justice, to country and to God enabled Gladstone to glorify an empire. Loyalty to conscience helped the Puritans plant a nation which shall stand in blessing until time shall be no more."

And disloyalty to manhood, to the spirit of the age, to the laws of God drove the nation into war, and when the war was fought with greatest, when Lincoln lay in his winding sheet, the awful price disloyalty had cost was fully understood. He quoted the lines:

BLAME WHERE IT BELONGS.

I know that this is an unpopular thing to do—denounce the party now in power," he declared, "but I want to place the blame where it belongs and it belongs with the American party. The council could easily pass an ordinance making these machines illegal, but that body will not do it, and the chairman of the license committee says that the city needs the money exacted from the machines every month."

When the "Americans" asked for our support last fall they promised that they would suppress gambling in Salt Lake," he said. "In a way they have done so, but these nefarious devices are still allowed to run, and I for one will not support a party that cannot keep its word."

REV. B. F. SHORT.

At the First Methodist church, Rev. B. F. Short went more specifically into the heart of the "American" party, and an audience upon slot machines, and their influence upon morals. "The American party is responsible for the fact that slot machines are allowed to run," he declared, "and it cannot hope for the support of purity loving people at the next election unless it abolishes them at once."

Rev. Mr. Short took as his theme "Because We Need the Money," taking up the cause of the "American" party, and considering especially the matter of slot machines, and their relationship to the "American" party's broken pledges.

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"The newspapers have been uniform in their wish to abolish this evil. All of them see the necessity of doing away with this vicious system, and they have urged prohibitory licenses, which are a very good way to settle the difficulty."

The speaker referred to Judge Diehl's decision as one case which did not cover the slot machines that were really objectionable, since it affected only the shoe-lace and chewing gum machines. His sermon was listened to by a large congregation.
