Why has it been forgotten? Because English-speaking people are as much controlled by greed, by worship of manimon as the Spaniards ever were. We are but little in advance of Spain as the guardlan of men and women who are wholly incompetent to hold their cwn against men whose lives are devoted, not to the good of man-kind, but to the acquirement of wealth by any means.

If law of nature and law of God are the same, then I see annihilation for all the weaker portions of the human race, for as the strongest grow stronger, the weaker become less competent to with-stand them. If, on the other hand, it stand them. If, on the other hand, it is the will and purpose of God that injustice and unrighteousness shall be overthrown and a time come when the weak shall have the same protection as the strong can command, then, without meaning any irreverence. I beg to out meaning any irreverence, I beg to say that, in my opinion, it is time something shoud be done; and I say again that the first thing to do is to convert Christians to Christianity; that is, persuade them that Indians. Cubans. Porto Ricans and Philippinos are just as

much the children of God as are the sons and daughters of the United States, or any other so-called civilized nation.

## SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

The new diving dress of Mr. Wm. Gordon, of Melbourne, consists of a copper head piece and jacket, screwed by simple joints to a body constructed of strong spiral metal springs imbeded in layers of rubber and cloth. The legs and arms are quite flexible, yet are so constructed that there are not the slightest water pressure on the diver.

In a recent dive, the diver reached the great depth of 200 feet, remaining under water 51 minutes, with no renewal of air for 12 minutes, and suffered noinconvenience.

The use of cork as a paving material fo roads has been under test for several years in London and other cities, and is years in London and other cities, and is now reported to have given highly sat-lsfactory results. The pavement not only affords a good foothold but it is only allows a good formula out it is practically non-absorbent and noise-less. The cork is ground, mixed with bitumen and a sultable fibrous mablumen and a suitame librous material, and formed into blocks under a pressure of 600 pounds per square inch; and these blocks are laid on a cement concrete foundation of suitable depth.

The prevalent notion that vegetarianism affords freedom from digestive derangements is disputed by a British
surgeon, who asserts that a year's
residence in India, where the natives
are mostly vegetarians, will convince
the most skeptical that no class of diet
confers even partial immunity from
disords of digestion. Severe cases of
dyspepsia in strict vegetarians are not
uncommon at the general hospital of
Madras. In one of these, a man who
had weighed but 52 pounds was fled
with peptonized milk and essence of
chicken until he reached 104 pounds,
when he was dismissed.

Duodecaplex telegraphy has been re-celving the attention of M. Mercadier. a French electrician, for many years, In experiments now being made on the Paris-Bordeaux line, twelve Morse transmitters are worked simultaneoustransmitters are worked simultaneously on a single wire, each sending its signals to the proper receivers at the end of the line. This result is attained by means of interrupted currents. Each transmitter receives its current through an electrically-vibrated turning fork whose vibrations are ed turning fork, whose vibrations are of the period necessary to cause resonor the period necessary to cause resonance in the proper receiving circuit, which has its self-induction and capacity correspondingly adjusted. The receiver, called a monotelephone, is also acoustically adapted for damping out undesired signals, the combination effecting so complete a sifting that only a slight and not troublesome murmur comes from the unintended nals. The sounds are brought to the ear by rubber tubes.

Few American perfumes were forty or fifty years ago, according to Mr. O. B. Sallsbury. The annual product is now about \$2,500,000 worth. while the imports reach \$1,500,000 worth. and Greater New York uses \$1,000,000 worth, and Greater New York uses \$1,000,000 worth. For this billions of billions of flowers are consumed. The importation each year oil of roses is about \$250,-000 worth, and each pound of this requires about thirteen tons of roses, the pearls of 400,000 roses being computed to be necessary for an ounce of oil: The gathering of the roses employs 750,000 people in southern Europe from the middle of May to the middle of July. The odors are obtained from the roses, violets, jasmines, tuberoses, mignon-ettes, and other flowers, by absorption ettes, and other lowers, by absorption in fat, distillation, or extraction with ether, sulphide of carbon, or chloride of methyl. Artificial synthetic perfumes are blended with the flower pomades or essential oils, musk, albergris, or civet, to form vast quantities of fashionable brands of perfumes. The more important of the artificial per-fumes are terpineol (lilac scent), salifumes are terpined (maskert), san-cylic aldehyde (meadow sweet scent), vamillion (vamila scent), cumarin (new mown hay scent, eugenol (clove scent), lonone (violet scent), cinnamyt (alcohol hyacinth scent), anisic alde-hyhe (hawthorn scent).
