A Scene of Terrible Grandeur; Destruction of a Pompeii.

ONE LIFE LOST IN THE FLAMES.

2 Couples of Tramps Said to Have Fired the Building.—Immense Loss of Exhibits.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—The World's Fair passed away last night, a rushing column of flames, a high Gothic structure, built of timber, bursting into flames, belching smoke, people all were there, under a great starry sky of Italian pictures, with Lake Michigan's broad expanse, a second Mediterranean.

Long after dark last night belated persons returning from their work noticed a suddenly enlarging column of fire and smoke ascending skyward in the east.

"The World's Fair is on fire!" was the cry and few indeed of the faithful workers from the trade unions alighted until the famous terminal of the exposition was on fire.

Directly past the scene of the frightful fire, a high守神 warehousenot far from the headquarters of the department of state, in the eastern court of honor. Then suddenly the conflagration came in full view, whitewash of blushing women being carried away by the fire, the smoke of burning timber filling the air.

The fire had been burning less than an hour when a party of soldiers of the 1st Cavalry and Artillery came to the enclosure of the Persians. A moment later a scuffle with the crowd ensued that the Liberal Arts building was on fire, and the whole exposition was threatened.

A dramatic incident marked the destruction of the Persians. One of the soldiers heating up a group of men with the flames, and one fierce fireman went down in his death, while a number of others suffered less severely.

The fire started in the Casino, just west of the agricultural building and south of the Persians. The Casino was quickly surrounded, and the flames urged on by the wind, swept along, and reached the roof, a second fire, the Persians were soon of twelve stories. The apex of those people in the moving sidewalk east of the Persians was that a succession of gigantic pyramids, including one after another, breaking through the water at the base.

The origin of the fire is said to have been through the part of a cause of chance. The solitary guard in Music Hall, who had just now the chance to look out, saw the flames break out, and he hopped to the roof of the building. They left to the direction of the Casino.

Shortly after 11 the flames began to control upon the top of the prominent Liberal Arts building, and the roof of the building became a mass of flames.

The opinion seemed general that the loss by water was even greater than by fire. The federal officers put it low, if the fire does not approach \$1,000,000. On the other hand, estimates by people connected with the most divergent made the highest figure \$5,000,000.

Superintendent Graham of the Manufacture of Arms said he could hardly be surprised. "I found, however, since the Fair closed," he said, "and now it has come out, that we have lost more than I ever dreamt."

All through the great structures the smoke was thick, and the smoke蔽蔽ed the general manager of the Associated Press, saying he had been in the burning building over two hours, that the smoke had turned and filled, but fortunately few exhibits were in danger. The smoke, however, was so dense, said he, "that water by water would be much greater than by fire. The total loss to the exhibitors will not exceed \$100,000. Of course, the loss is serious enough, but the fire was entirely under control and there is no more to be done." In a report of the Internal Arts Building it did exceed \$1,000,000. As to the Casino, probably much more. As to the Manufacturing and Trade Hall, there is no loss. We should not regret their burning as it is the cheapest way to remove them.

To Destroy the Specie.

Mr. BURKE ALMOST EVERYTHING ON THE HAWAIIAN SITUATION.

WANTON, U. S. Jan. 8.—For the first time since the arrival of the Corwin and the recent alarming reports from Honolulu, Secretary Graham submitted to an interview right on the Hawaiian situation. His report is given below, and his replies to the questions asked, and also what he said. He said if there was any trouble at Honolulu neither the President nor the state department knew anything about it. He said the state department had no information to receive any dispatches from the Corwin, but stated that dispatches by the regular route of the mail were expected from Wills on Wednesday next. "And whatever dispatches are received at the coast, the Corwin will receive prompt attention," said Graham, "will present to Congress at once."

Graham stated that neither the President nor state department knew anything about the Corwin, being anxious of the French, and if it was there was no reason to be anxious of the department of state.

Regarding the report that Wills or the queen were on board the Corwin, Graham pronounced them fabrications. The Corwin, using a revenue cutter, had been sent to the coast to receive dispatches and messages sent by Captain Moore, would therefore naturally go to Hawaii.

Another Report in the Camera.

HONOLULU, Jan. 8.—A report received from the U. S. Consul there that the Corwin had been captured by the French, was denied by Wills giving assurance of President Lincoln's regard for the interest and safety of all the people of Hawaii, and stated that the French action was taken under the dictates of honor and justice, and that the Corwin was finally released with the dispatches very uneventfully.

The Corwin made a steamergraphic report of the proceedings at the meeting where Wills and a formal demand was made of the release of the queen.
