Again, Messrs. Webster, Lewis & Co., lead smelters of New York, have said that this Emma ore, and if the U. P. freight were not so exorbitant, they would very much prefer to send over the road their works three hundred and sixty tons of the same ore per month during the next twelve months.

Let us examine this point! It is simply absurd that the U. P. Pacific has charged \$350 for a car of bullion over their road, when the same car could be sent from Omaha to New York, fifty per cent. greater distance, and over three different roads, for \$140.
