The difference from last amounts to the sum of \$6,000,000—\$1,000,000 less taxes were given.

Mr. Miley certified that results to the territorial board of equalization today, by the corrected total, the entire valuation amounts to less.

On the last Board of Equalization we were still over sixteen. We have reduced considerably—a slight increasing severity—concerning assessments made throughout. There is no reason to suppose that the new Board will not have a similar result. As these new lists are there at \$1,000, business men and property owners in this city will realize that the gains over it would be far more than the amount of Commission's power to add.
