

FIRE STAMPEDES ELEPHANT HERD

Rushed Madly Through Town,
Knocking Down Fences and
Out Buildings.

WOMAN TRAMPLED TO DEATH

One Intoxicated Beast Invaded Court of
Hotel and Spread Terror on
All Sides.

Riverside, Cal., April 16.—As a result of a fire which started early this afternoon at the Standard Oil company's storage tanks, a herd of elephants was stampeded. L. J. Worsley lies at the City hospital fatally injured, and Miss Ella Gibbs, a church deaconess, was fatally injured. A sudden boom which was heard at 1:20 marked the explosion of the large oil tank. Worsley was a driver of the delivery wagon from which the fire was communicated to the tanks, and was hurled many yards from the spot and picked up with his clothing ablaze. The explosion and the fire caused the elephants, which instantly became a mass of flames.

A circus, three blocks distant, was about to open for the afternoon performance. The explosion and the fire caused the showmen to lower the tents after dispersing the crowd which had assembled. The herd of elephants became uncontrollable and they dashed to the east side of town, knocking down fences, outhouses, and demolishing orchards that lay in their path.

Many persons narrowly escaped the infuriated animals. In a short time, however, all but the largest elephants were rounded up. The leader of the herd then changed his course and entered the center of the city, one mile distant. He entered the court of the Glenwood hotel, one of the famous hostleries of the coast. Miss Gibbs was in the yard in front of the house. The elephant entered the house, and the house between his tusks, threw her to the ground and trampled upon her, crushing her chest and inflicting fatal injuries. The animal then proceeded to the doorway, the guests running, panic-stricken, indoors. D. P. Chapman, a guest of the house, attempted to avenge the animal from the court. He was knocked down and had several ribs broken and was otherwise injured.

The beast crushed through the door, walked through the barber shop and out on the main street, crossed the street, crashed through the heavy plate-glass window in a store. Before being rounded up at a downtown public stable, the animal trampled on another man and seriously gored him with his tusks.

One of the keepers attempted to subdue the animal, but was hurled over a high fence, sustaining painful injuries. Not until four other elephants were brought to the stable was the huge beast gotten under control and taken to the circus grounds.

By the time the entire town was in an uproar, the ladies of the east side were afraid to venture into the streets, fearing that the herd had not been captured.

throughout the afternoon and 60,000 gallons of oil were consumed, including the contents of the exploded tanks and much case goods. Two large tanks containing a high-grade, non-explosive oil, escaped the flames. The oil loss was \$2,000, and the loss on the buildings is \$4,000.

Miss Gibbs died at 10 o'clock to-night.

Miss Ella Gibbs was a deaconess in the First Congregational church of this city. Before coming here, about three years ago, she had been a prominent worker in the slums of Chicago. Since her arrival in Riverside she had been doing mission work among the Chinese and Japanese population and also assisting convalescents who arrived here penniless.

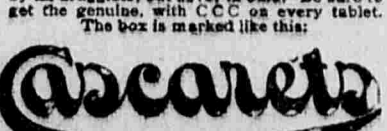

NATIONAL CIVIC FEDERATION BILL

President Low Offers Amend-
ments Making Interstate Com-
merce Commission Arbitrator.

CARNEGIE SUPPORTS THEM.

Deems it Necessary That Government
Have Control Over Interstate
Commerce Common Carriers.

Washington, April 16.—Hearings on the national civic federation bill, to amend the Sherman anti-trust law, were continued today before Chairman Littlefield's sub-committee of the house judiciary committee. Seth Low, president of the federation, submitted amendments to his bill, so altering its provisions that the interstate commerce commission, instead of the president and the commissioner of corporations, shall be the arbitrator of all matters of reference, designation and difficulty which would arise under the operation of the bill. Mr. Low said these amendments had been agreed upon as likely to meet and satisfy the most serious of the objections thus far urged against the federation's measure.

Mr. Low laid before the commission a letter from Andrew Carnegie in support of the proposed changes. Mr. Carnegie's letter was written with the purpose of supporting the idea that authority should not be divided between the interstate commerce commission and other bodies and other officials, but be taken up at that point he discussed other questions. He considered that it was necessary for the government to have control over common carriers engaged in interstate commerce, and declared that this power should be lodged in the interstate commerce commission. He suggests that industrial concerns engaged in interstate traffic should be similarly controlled, and proceeded:

"I cannot too strongly advise against there being more than one authority to pass upon such questions, and that should be the interstate commerce commission. If common carriers are placed under one commission and industrial interstate commerce under the bureau of corporations or another commission, there is bound to be comparisons between the two. Such comparisons will be publicly made. The party denied by the one will be disposed to feel that the other takes more liberal views, and vice versa, and vent his disappointment. Imagine two supreme courts. The standing of both courts would be lowered."

"No reason why the interstate commerce commission should not deal with the whole subject and every reason why it should. Its members will get a wider view of the whole question in its different phases. It is really one question, not two. We have seen, for instance, that the steel rail question is much upon a par with the common carrier question, both being exceptional."

"One point seems to be essential—without it little general progress can be made—viz: When new combinations are proposed the first question must always be: 'What is the object sought?' In 89 cases out of a hundred it will undoubtedly be to rob the community of its right to the benefits of free competition, disguise it as we may; therefore, the commission's duty is to obtain satisfactory proof that the application is to cover an exceptional case. The conditions must be as peculiar as those of common carriers and steel rail agreements are. If not, the application should be denied. If granted, then measures must be taken to safeguard and insure the consumers the results that competition would bring. Nothing should prevent this. That the combination be reasonable is not sufficient."

"We are doing pioneer work just now, work that this vast Union must do sooner or later, but the history of the supreme court should lead us to press forward now. The interstate commerce commission has already made a much better start than the supreme court did."

Henry Towne, representing the Merchants' association of New York, opposed the federation bill.

"As business men," he said, "want a law which will define our rights—which will tell us what we may and what we may not do. The federation bill does not do this."

In conclusion, Mr. Towne said that the best course for Congress to pursue would be to appoint a competent commission, which during the recess shall collect evidence, study the problem and report its conclusions as a basis for constructive legislation during the session of Congress which will begin next December.

SUBMARINE BOATS.

Secretary of Navy Given Free Hand in
Purchase of Kind.

Washington, April 16.—The long-existing controversy as to whether the United States navy should have submarine torpedo boats of the Holland type, as recommended by the committee on naval affairs, was settled in the house of representatives today, when after a lengthy and lively debate the proviso limiting the secretary of the navy to purchase only boats of the Holland type was stricken out. The effect of this action was to give the secretary a free hand in the selection of submarine boats.

The members haggled over almost every line of the three pages of the bill remaining to be disposed of when the house met, but the principal action was that with regard to the submarines.

A humorous speech by Mr. Williams, in which he had several friendly clashes with Mr. Hobson over warships and balloons, commanded the attention of the house for some time. After agreeing to take up the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill next, the house at 5:25 recessed until 10:30 tomorrow.

Winnipeg, April 16.—Three men were killed and four others were seriously injured in an explosion in the Old Mine, Canmore, Alberta, yesterday.

TOLEDO BANK FAILS.

CUPID BROKERAGE SHOP

Well Known Chicago Business Men to
Be Arrested for Running Mat-
rimonial Agencies.

Chicago, April 17.—Three business men, one of whom is a member of the South Shore Country club and the others likewise well known, will be arrested during the coming week charged with conducting a "Cupid brokerage on the side."

"We have the evidence to convict three men who are prominent in business and social circles of running matrimonial agencies," said Edward S. Shiner, assistant United States district attorney, last night. "These men, while not managers of soul making concerns, are the men who have put up the money for the business and are, in fact, those who derive the benefit from the fraudulent enterprises."

A crusade against matrimonial agencies has been started and before the district attorney's office quits, these concerns will be driven from Chicago and this district. I expect that in two weeks 22 managers of various agencies will be arrested."

"Since Marian Grey was convicted and sentenced for running a matrimonial agency," said Chief Justice E. Stuart, head of the Chicago postoffice inspectors, "our department has secured evidence against a score of 'soul making' concerns, and has reported to the district attorney's office. Many surprises will be sprung when the arrests are made."

FURNISHED BAD MEAT.

French Army Contractor Is Given Year
At Hard Labor for Doing It.

Paris, April 16.—A butcher of Bar-le-Duc named Levy has been sentenced to one year's imprisonment at hard labor on the charge of having furnished bad meat to the army. This is the second head of the investigation ordered recently by Minister of War Picquart as a result of the allegation brought to the notice of the ministry that the commissary department of the army was involved in scandals in the purveying of stores.

REPORTED SLAUGHTER OF WHITES BY INDIANS

New Orleans, April 15.—A report that about 80 whites and Indians have been killed in Nicaragua in bloody bush warfare, waged by Mosquito Indians, was brought here today by W. R. Coffman of Bloomington, Ill., who was a passenger on the steamer Dictator from Central American ports. The death list of whites numbers about 20.

The fighting started over a month ago on the Caribbean coast, where the Indians are. Since then, Mr. Coffman said, many troops have been sent into the Mosquito district and several skirmishes have occurred, and the Indians have attacked two towns.
