LOCAL BRIEFS.

Five Hundred Applicants—Nearly 800 additional applications were made yesterday for admission to the High School.

Sheep Dipping Begins—The sheep dipping season began on the 1st inst. and continues until Nov. 1, under the joint supervision of the state and government. Rams may be dipped until Dec. 15. At last evening's session of the state sheep commission, it was reported that the sheep of the state were in good condition.

Telegram Around Fear—Mrs. Kate Mulheren of this city is in an anxious state, having received a telegram received yesterday, informing her that James J. Mulheren had been burned to death in a fire at Grand Forks, Ida. Mrs. Mulheren's husband's name is John H. Mulheren, but the similarity in the names and the fact that he was in that part of Idaho at the time of the fire makes her fear for the worst.

Struck by Street Car—Mrs. Elizabeth Hodges, aged 65, was struck by a street car at 8th and Main on the 4th last evening at about 7:30 p.m., and sustained a fracture of the left leg and several severe bruises. Mrs. Hodges had endeavored to cross the street in front of the car when she was struck. She was injured woman was removed to the home of her daughter at 1227 Pacific street, where she was attended by Dr. Joseph H. Robinson.

Hog Chokers Found—State Veterinarian C. Young found three hogs infected with cholera, yesterday on the farm of A. N. Stephens at Birch Creek. The hogs were killed and burned, the pens destroyed, and the ground there plowed up. Dr. Young says there is no reacquisition among the sheep near Provo, but was reported, though the animals are suffering from hoof rot. Some 520 sheep near Hohenberg were discovered in trouble. They have been quarantined and most of them will be killed.

Wool Men Assessed—The Utah Wool Growers' association, an organization antedating the present association, met yesterday afternoon to provide for raising means to pay off the judgment held against it by attorneys for service of process. The members decided to levy assessments based on indebtedness of members on account of delinquent dues and assessments. The owners of the judgment secured in 1905 are James H. Moyle, Brown & Henderson, Lindsay R. Rogers, and Street & Rogers.

Bets Wins His Case—John E. Bets of 161 south Eleventh East street, proved himself to be as good a cross-examiner as any lawyer in the state, and won his own case after an all day trial before a jury in Justice of the Peace Stanley A. Hanks' court yesterday. Mr. Bets was charged with having fished in the Jordan Narrows Sunday, Aug. 8, without the proper license. In defending himself he got Deputy Warden Sam Wright, who became tangled up with even the County Attys. Bets could not straighten the latter out, and the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.
