#### FLAG DAY PROCLAMATION.

Cutler Designates June 14 as The Official Date.

A proclamation has been issued by Gov. Cutler designating Friday, June 14, as "Flag day," and calling upon the people of the state to properly observe

people of the state to properly observe the day by displaying the flag on all public and private buildings and having appropriate exercises in the schools. It also recommends that all business houses be closed on that day. The proclamation follows:

To the citizens of our great republic the birth of the American flag is of scarcely less interest than the birth of the American nation. The day made memorable by the official adoption of the emblem of our liberty and everlasting union deserves as sincere and joyous observance as that greatest of all

ing union deserves as sincere and joyous observance as that greatest of all our national days, the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

On the 14th of June, A. D. 1907, the flag of our beloved country will be 130 years old. It is fitting that the giving to the world of its most beautiful standard should be celebrated by every community the flag has blessed and by whose people it is revered. In the day and its meaning, there is a lesson of increasing patriotism for the old, of veneration and allegiance for the young. No American can love his country or its flag too much. And this love cannot be more strongly and appropriately taught at any time than on "Flag day."

Now, therefore, recognizing the love of Utah's citizens for the flag and for of Utah's citizens for the flag and for the principles of government it represents, and their loyalty to the nation and its officials, I. John C. Cutler, governor of the State of Utah, do hereby designate and appoint Friday. June 14, 1807, as Flag day, and recommend its patriotic and heart-felt observance by all the people of Utah. So far as practicable, business should be suspended; the national colors should be displayed on public and private buildings; and exercises in honor of the flag should be held under the auspices of the public schools. In the spirit of love and liberty and peace and patriotism, all citizens should join in honoring the day which means so much to our state, and to the honored nation of which it to the honored nation of which it forms so illustrious a part.

County Commissioners Pass an Amended Ordinance Calling for Inspectors.

At the meeting of the county commissioners yesterday afternoon an amended license ordinance was passed regulating the license of all kinds of business in the county and providing for a strict inspection of all slaughter houses so as to compel them to be kept in a sanitary condition. The ordinance fixes licenses as follows: For a mercantile business of over \$500, the fee is \$12.50 per quarter; from \$200 to \$500, \$6.25 per quarter; 200 or under, \$3 per quarter.

Peddlers, restaurant keepers, livery and stable keepers, hotels, boarding-houses, rooming-houses, auctioneers, brokers, pawnbrokers, money changers, traveling showmen, exhibitions, theatrical performances, circuses or menageries, pay \$6.25 per quarter.

Butchers and persons engaged in the slaughter-house business must keep a record of all calle killed by them together with the brands and names of persons who sold them. The license inspector must inspect every slaughter-house at least once each quarter and see that it is kept in a sanitary condition. regulating the license of all kinds of
