Workingmen's Convention.

COLUMBUS, O., 13.—About 150

backers agreed to withdraw their

ment, provided their ideas of cur-

rency reform were heartily acquies-

ced in; this was agreed to. The

platform demands payment of the

bonds at or before maturity, the re-

monetization of silver, repeal of

the resumption act, unsectarian

schools, wholesome government,

control of corporations, favors a

gradual income tax, public lands

for actual settlers, government has

the prerogative of issuing coin and

providing both metallic and paper
