Readville. Mass., Sept. 3.—Over a track fully two seconds slower, than when the great Lou Dillon startled the world with a mile in two minutes, the trotting geiding Uhlan defeated Ham-bing Belle in straight heats at the Pendetlik treat today in the second burg Relle in straight heats at the Readville track today in the second meeting of the pair to decide the trot-

ting championship of the world. Hamburg Helle was favorite before the start at odds of 5 to 3, because of the start at odds of 5 to 3, because of her success last week in the initial meeting of the cracks at Cleveland. At that meet she earned the world's record of 3.01% for indicers in a race, two seconds better than the previous mark, which had slood since the Cres-ceps-The Abbott race at Brighton Back in 1995.

As soon as Mr. Curtiss and Bishop return, the Aero club will take steps to locate a field on which the next international contexts are to be held, probably in August, 1919. Allan R. Hawley of the executive committee of the Aero club, states that many western cities are entering into a keen competition to accure the inter-national race meeting.
