

A BITTER PILL FOR CANADA

Official Opinion a Ottawa is She Must Pay Damages and Apologize to Japan.

VANCOUVER CASE REGRETTED

Domestic Treaty With Japan Provides Japanese Shall Have Full Liberty to Travel and Reside in Canada.

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 9.—The general opinion in official circles is that Canada will have to pay damages and apologize to Japan for damages caused by the Vancouver riots to property of the Japanese in that city. It is expressed that the outbreak should have taken place at a time when the Japanese immigration question was all but solved between the governments of Canada and Japan.

Hon. R. W. Scott, secretary of state, in an interview, said that the treaty between Canada and Japan, which was signed by the Canadian parliament at its last session, was perfectly clear, as to the rights of the Japanese in Canada. The treaty says:

"The subjects of each of the two high contracting parties shall have full liberty to enter, travel or reside in the dominions and possessions of the other contracting party and shall enjoy full and perfect protection for their persons and property."

"The treaty was not adopted in a hurry," said Mr. Scott, "it was in force between Great Britain and Japan 19 years before we became a party to it. It was given full consideration before we accepted it. The opposition in parliament blamed us because we did not become a party to it earlier than we did. There was no protest from British Columbia or anywhere else against it. British Columbia benefits now and will benefit still further as time goes on by the trade between Canada and Japan. But all events, Canada ratified the treaty and passed statutes to that effect at the last session of parliament."

"The Dominion government has made great progress in the direction of making an amicable arrangement with Japan, restricting Japanese immigration to about 500 a year," no matter where they came, and it is hoped that the disturbance will in no way interfere with the negotiations.

BUBONIC PLAGUE.

Two More Deaths Occur from it in San Francisco.

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—Two more deaths from bubonic plague occurred today and three additional cases were reported. Following are the totals of the disease to date: Number of cases, 2; number of deaths, 10. This is exclusive of the case in Berkeley, which proved fatal.

Attention is called to the fact that the death percentage is very

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low—less than one-half. The standard death rate for plague is about 90 per cent.

QUESTION OF CANADIAN JURISDICTION SOLVED.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 9.—An Ottawa dispatch says: By the establishment of customs port of entry, at Burwell, situated on the west of Cape Chudley, on Hudson Strait, the government has solved the problem of asserting and maintaining Canadian jurisdiction over the Hudson and more northerly waters. Duties are exacted only upon such goods as the shippers declare were intended for trading with the Eskimos, ships stores being untaxed.

CLEVELAND ELECTION.

President Roosevelt Will Take No Part in the Mayoralty Contest.

Oyster Bay, L. I., Sept. 9.—President Roosevelt will take no part in the mayoralty contest at Cleveland. This was made plain by Secy. Loeb today.

Secy. Loeb said that the president, if he spoke at Cleveland, would have nothing to say regarding Congressman Burton's candidacy.

FIRE IN PORTLAND, OR.

Portland, Or., Sept. 9.—A new building nearing completion for the Haxelwood Creamery company was destroyed by fire here today. The fire was caused by the explosion of a preparation for insulating. The loss will be about \$90,000. Two men were injured.

JAPANESE BONDS.

Redemption of \$110,000,000 of 6 Per Cents a Most Important Event.

Tokio, Sept. 10.—With the redemption today of the \$110,000,000 of 6 per cent sterling bonds, outstanding since 1906, the most important financial operation of the Japanese government in the current fiscal year, at least so far as the foreign markets are concerned, is carried to completion. The bonds were redeemed by means of a \$115,000,000 per cent sterling loan, raised in New York, London and Paris last March. According to the last government financial report, Japan's debt has increased \$164,252,200 in the last year.

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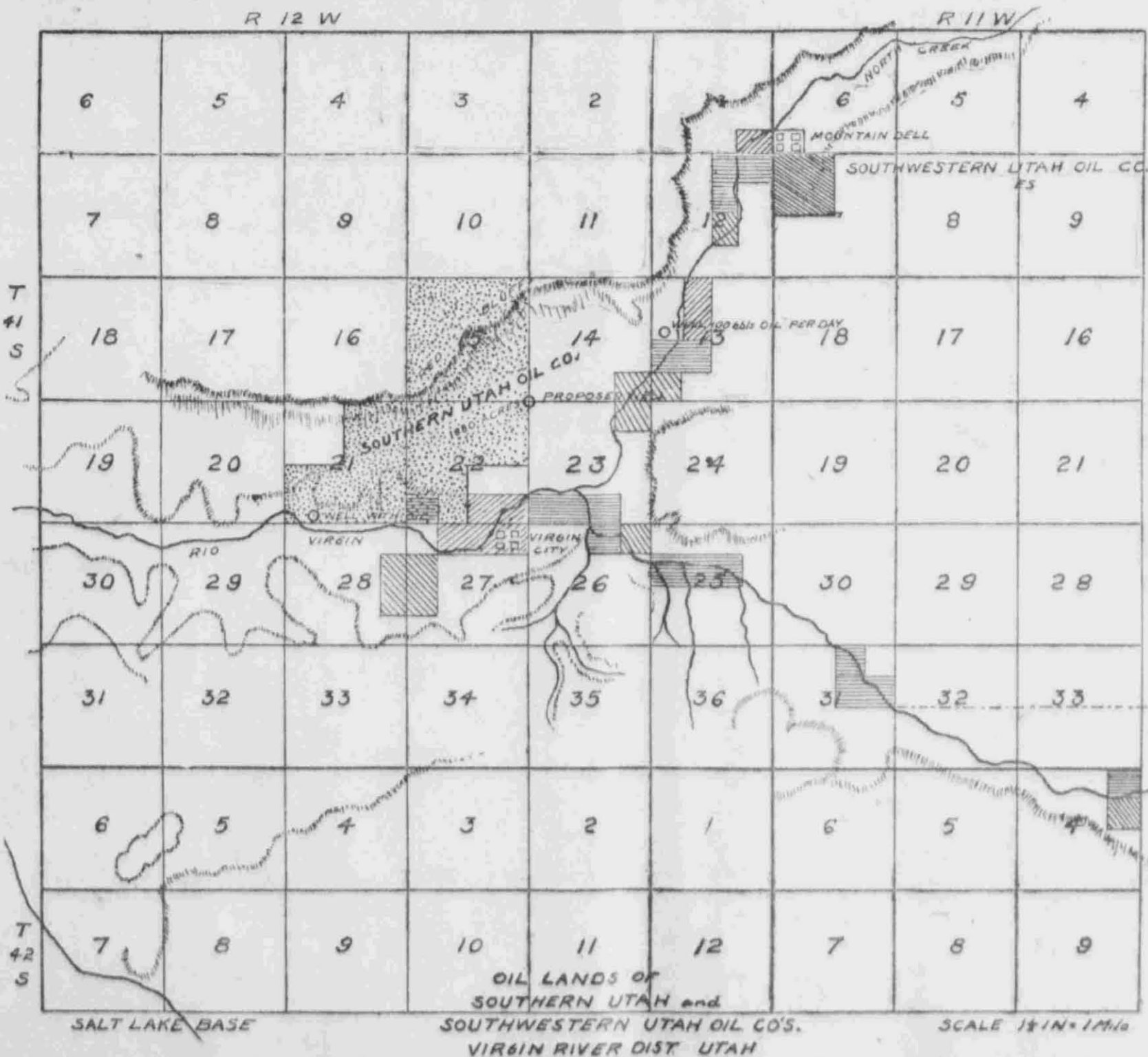
