

**STATE LAWMAKERS.**

Day at Work on the Thirty-Eighth Day.

**IMPORTANT MEASURES.**  
Budget for Dual and Double—State Board of Education—A Bill to Amend—General Matters.

The Legislature had a "fishing" session before it today in the form of a session of both houses, from Utah Lake, which was being shown by Fish Commissioner Moore. The legislation had a deep interest in the subjects and afterwards proceeded with the regular business of the session. The number of spectators that came to the proceedings was very small.

**THE SENATE.**

The opening business of the session was the presentation of a petition, by Senator McKay of Ogden taxpayers, on the subject of official salaries. The petition was read three times, and passed by a vote of 42 ayes, with 21 nays.

S. B. No. 23, relating to arrests in civil actions, was placed upon its passage.

Mr. Critchlow explained that the measure was introduced to give the Legislature an opportunity to act upon the bill to their satisfaction, and asked unanimous consent to have the bill referred to the committee.

Mr. Condon objected.

Mr. Lewis moved to suspend the rules to consider the bill, but withdrew without calling the motion.

Mr. Simon didn't want the motion withdrawn; if it was, he would himself make a motion to have the proper steps taken to recommit the bill.

It was claimed that he had another remedy and withdrew his motion.

Mr. Gibson asked, in view of the fact that there was no copy of the bill on file, nor anywhere else in sight, if it would not be a good idea to have a copy made available to the members of the board.

All this talk occurred in the midst of roll call on the passage of the bill. The call was presented with a vote of 19 to 31, with 26 ayes, deeming the measure.

Mr. Lewis moved a reconsideration of the bill to the executive committee, and recommended the passage of a bill in place against the executive branch.

**MOTION BILL.**

A communication was received from the State Auditor concerning the signature of S. B. No. 44, suspending the time for redemption of property until take, was H. B. No. 57, that the place of trial of all criminal cases was agreed by the president of the Senate.

**MAILING LAW.**

Reintroduced S. B. C. R. 8, providing for the secretary of State sending copies of laws to the county courts. The rules were suspended and all passed.

**STATE BILL.**

Introduced S. B. 74, providing for the duties of the Governor and his salary; referred to the committee on judiciary.

**SENATOR INTRODUCED S. B. 75,**

dealing with state audit and financial committee.

Introduced S. B. 76, for a committee of state examiners; committee to consider.

Warren introduced S. B. 77, settling of estates of deceased persons; committee to consider.

**STATE BUDGET.**

Under the direction of the Governor and his salary, was adopted the budget of the State for the fiscal year.

Mr. Condon moved a motion to adjourn the session.

There was a short poll in the proceedings and a motion to adjourn at 12:30 was unanimously carried.

**Notes.**

Mr. Condon's reports are sometimes minute-provoking.

The House did considerable business today and did quietly.

The anti-trust bill will create considerable interest when the judiciary committee reports it to the House.

The legislator that ponders to a close the disregard of the rights of others needs watching. Capable legislators do not indulge in class legislation.

House committees met yesterday afternoon and this morning, but there is so much work ahead of them that final results were arrived at in but few cases.

Allen's bill providing for a State printer was taken up and read.

The third reading of the bill was then passed.

Allen Miller offered several amendments, but was under discussion when the session went to press.

**THE HOUSE.**

After the House recessed business was done with one slight exception the session was adjourned.

**POSITIONS AND CLAIMS.**

There being no unfinished business in the House, the minister of petitions took up.

Petition No. 12, presented by Mr. Curtis, was from the State Auditor, asking the passage of S. B. No. 50, relating to the election of State Auditor.

The second petition was made of a citizen of Ogden, from 20 months of Ogden, Weber County.

Another petition came from Ogden, asking the repeal of the present law, and the creation of a new police and fire committee, with one division, and two others, amounting to \$300,000.

The same committee recommended the same, with amendments, of \$300,000.

The committee, with amendments, of \$300,000, was adopted.

The committee on judiciary reported the same, with S. B. N. 51, and the report was adopted with one division.

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The same committee recommended that H. B. No. 105 be not passed, and the House adopted the recommendation.

The committee on contingent expenses and payment of bills amounting to \$300,110 and the recommendation was adopted.

House joint memorial No. 1, relating to the separation of a certain portion of Arizona to Utah, was reported back from the Senate as having been signed by the President and had, and was signed by the Speaker.

**NOTICE REGARDING BILLS.**

H. B. No. 12 was introduced by Taylor. The bill authorizes the taxation of gifts, legacies, etc., and was referred to the judiciary committee.

**BILL ORDERED PRINTED.**

An motion of Mr. Harris, an order was given for the printing of 200 copies of the bill.
