CITY COUNCIL BUSINESS.

At the City Council meeting held in regular session on Tuesday evening, all the members being present.

After some discussion on the minutes of the previous session, resulting in the unanimous adoption of the same, the following resolutions were adopted:

The report of the committee on engineering recommended the printing of various city reports, was laid over to next week.

The committee on fire recommended that W. A. Hampton be allowed the use of the waste at the fire department, up to December 31, 1900, by the payment to the treasurer of \$1. Adopted.

The committee on streets recommended that J. A. Jos's petition for certain work on his sidewalk be filed. Adopted.

The committee on public buildings and grounds recommended that as the school board had sole charge of the same, the complaint of certain ladies in regard to the janitor in connection with the school, be referred to the board of education, and also recommended the resolution adopted in connection with the janitor to be carried over to the next meeting.

The committee on claims recommended that the claim of ex-Mayor John A. Egan for \$200 back salary, be not allowed. The report was adopted.

The committee on taxes recommended that E. R. Christofferson be allowed to pay for the redemption of certain land and two dollars in cash. The report was adopted.

The committee on fire recommended that the interest amounting to \$1,254.37 be appropriated.

PROGRESS OF STATE WELL.

The iron county well boring machine, under the efficient management of Mr. George Halterman of Parowan, is making commendable progress on the State well now being sunk on the upper part of the desert near the thriving town of Enterprise, in Washington county; the formation thus far encountered has been of one class, sand and rock, it is now down some 500 feet and still driving; no flow has yet been encountered. It is the intention to continue driving until a depth of 1,000 feet is attained, when the opinion of the company's manager be done with regard to difficulty, as the company has procured a new up to date well boring machine with steam power attachment and claim the machine to be the fastest and most efficient of any machine in the State. In these seasons of drought it would be a great relief to our farmers, could artesian water be obtained in this arid and dry belt; the State Legislature should be commended for the start made in this needed adventure, which it is hoped will prove successful.

We have another acquisition to the professional fraternity, Attorney V. Rapp, late of Richfield, Sevier county, has opened a law office in our midst, and has engaged rooms over the drug store in our town intending to make Cedar his future home.

It is expected that Washington's Birthday will be celebrated at the Branch Normal, by a program meeting in the morning, and sports on the campus in the afternoon, finishing the day by a grand ball in the evening, a general good time is anticipated.

FARMINGTON.

Davis County Affairs - County Divided into Two Sanitary Districts.

Farmington, Davis Co., Feb. 19.-The board of county commissioners of this county were in regular session today.

The reports of the treasurer and auditor of the county for the year 1899 were read and approved. The reports show the total receipts for the year to have been \$21,597.74. The total disbursements were \$21,516.16. Cash on hand Dec. 31st, is \$7,379.58.

Several bad matters had the attention of the board.

SANITARY DISTRICTS.

An ordinance dividing the county into two sanitary districts was passed. All the county lying outside the limits of the city of Henrietta, and north of the south line of Kaysville precinct is included in district number two, with Dr. Gleason of Kaysville as health officer; and all south of that line is included in district number one, with Dr. Mary A. Patterson of Bonanza as health officer.
