AMERICAN.

DETROIT, Mich., 3.—The heavy wind of the last three days culminated in a hurricane last night. Dispatches from Lakes Erie, Michigan and Ontario show that the damages to shipping have been numerous and severe. Only one death resulted so far as known.

OMAHA, 3.—A majority of the men, about 100 in number, employed at the Omaha Smelting Works, struck to-day. Cause, lengthening the hours of work and no advance in wages. Everything is quiet to-night. An orderly mass meeting was held and resolutions adopted.

CHICAGO, 3.—The *Times' Sparta*, Wisconsin, special says: News is just received from Wilton of a horrible affair which took place there on Thursday night. Mrs. William Van Voorhees, a woman with three young children and about to become a mother again, had, after living unhappily with her husband in their home on the outskirts of the village, been deserted and left desolate and despondent. She frequently spoke of suicide to the neighbors, who prevented her from purchasing poison. On Thursday night about 9 o'clock her dwelling was discovered in flames, and when the neighbors reached the house and burst in the doors they proceeded to the bedroom, where a sickening spectacle greeted their eyes. The mother, nearly naked, lay face downward in the bed, with her two youngest children in the same position by her side. The hair, scalp and portions of the arms were burned off from each, and the blazing rafters from above were falling down upon them. The body of the oldest boy, aged 10, was found behind the bedroom door, burned to a crisp. Blood was found spattered upon the bed clothes and upon the mother's garments. Appearance indicated that the woman had poisoned herself and children, and that life was extinct before the flames reached them. No marks of violence could be discovered upon the bodies, but the matter is being rigidly investigated.

COLUMBIA, S. C., 3.—The testimony in Cardoza's trial closed this afternoon. The defendant, in cross-examination, testified that Hardy Solomon offered him a bribe of \$5,000 when visiting his private office to pay certain fraudulent claims, amounting to \$20,000. Solomon contradicted this statement, and alleged that he had given Cardoza three or four thousand dollars as part of fraudulent claims, substituted in this transaction. Solomon's cashier, Sealy, testified that when he presented the claims, Cardoza's clerk demurred to the payment, when Cardoza told him to pay the demand; it was none of his business. Counsel for the defendant subsequently admitted the substitution of the fraudulent claims. The arguments of counsel will begin on Monday. The jury is kept together and guarded every night.

LOUISVILLE, 4.—The *Courier Journal's* Glasgow, Ky., special says: About 2 o'clock this morning a fire broke out in the grocery of J. W. Dickey, and spread over the entire block from Main and Green Street to Main and Cross Street. Loss covered by insurance.

NEW ORLEANS, 4.—The steamer *Frankfort*, from Bremen, with 270 emigrants, mostly for Texas, has arrived. Captain Ruglist, of the *Frankfort*, reports that on Oct. 15th, he rescued the captain and seven of the crew of the water-logged schooner *Raywald Yarl*, from Lisbon, with salt for Norway, and brought them to this port.

PHILADELPHIA, 4.—Yates & Company's clothing store, Ledger Building, was robbed last night, of a tin box containing \$6,500 in small notes, and a bag of silver coin.

BOSTON, 5.—Jesse Pomeroy, the boy-murderer, serving a life sentence in Charlestown penitentiary, attempted to escape, last night, by removing stones from the wall of his cell.

WASHINGTON, 5.—As the funeral of Senator Morton takes place to-day, all the government departments and offices of the district government are closed. Flags are at half-mast and bells are being tolled in honor of the illustrious dead.

The House committee on foreign affairs, to-day, received a communication from Secretary Evarts recommending an appropriation of \$225,000 for American representation at the Paris Exposition.

President F. M. Lyman called the meeting to order. The Tooele choir sang a hymn. Prayer by Elder N. H. Felt. Singing by the choir.

John Shields, sen., was appointed clerk of this conference.

PRESIDENT LYMAN

read the statistical report of this County, as presented at the General Conference and said he had visited all the wards in the County and found them generally well united. He felt determined to do his duty and prayed for the blessing of God to rest on all who would speak during this Conference.

The Bishops from the various wards being all present, gave in their verbal reports, all agreeing that there was a marked improvement and the Saints as a general thing showed a determination to attend to their duties more faithfully than heretofore.

ELDER ORSON PRATT

Said he was glad to be once more among the Saints in Tooele. Since he was here last, he had performed a short mission to Europe. In regard to the statistical report, he believed it was as correct as could be got under the circumstances, but in future some things would have to be amended. Was glad to hear the good reports from the Bishops, hoped a progressive improvement would continue.

PRESIDENT LYMAN

Presented the authorities of the Church as sustained at the General Conference at Salt Lake City on the 6th and 7th insts. The vote was unanimous. The following local authorities were also unanimously sustained:

F. M. Lyman as President of Tooele Stake of Zion, with James Ure and William Jeffries as his Counselors; John Rowberry as Patriarch of this Stake of Zion; George Atkin as Clerk, Recorder

and Superintendent, of Sunday schools, for this Stake. The Bishops of the several wards with their Counselors; the Presidents and Counselors of the various quorums; all the members of the High Council, with John Rowberry, Mattias Nelson, Riley Judd, James W. Rathall, W. C. Martindall, Wm. A. Picket, Alma H. Hale, and J. C. Anderson, as home missionaries; William Lee, Presiding Priest over the Indian mission in Tooele Stake of Zion.

ELDER JOSEPH F. SMITH addressed the Saints at some length and exhorted them to give up the use of all unnecessary things, such as liquors, tobacco, etc. Not only these, but many other articles might be dispensed with and the means applied to the building up of the kingdom of God. Bore his testimony to the upright character of our president, F. M. Lyman, exhorted the Saints to be obedient to his counsels, as he was worthy of their confidence.

PRESIDENT LYMAN

said the time of this Conference had been well spent; thanked the brethren and sisters for their attendance; the choir and musicians for their services.

The Conference adjourned, to meet at Grantsville on Saturday, January 27th, 1878, at 10 o'clock a. m.
