A meeting of certain stockholders of the Star Consolidated Mining company is being held this afternoon at the offices of Captain Timothy Egan in the Walker bank building. The purpose of the gathering is to further organize the forces opposed to the agreement entered into between the Packard inter-ests and W. V. Lander, in which the latter hoped to gain control of the Tin-

tic property on the strength of building a mill. The adjourned annual meeting is scheduled for tomotrow forenoon at 10 o'clock in the old labor hall over the Hill drug store on Second South street. There is little doubt expressed that Mr. Landers and his scheme will be severe-ly and effectively sat down upon.

THE JOHNNY GOLD MINE.

What Has Been and is Being Done at This Stateline Property.

W. A. Scott, the well known mining writer, in a contribution to the Engineering & Mining Journal gives the following description of the Johnny mine and mill at Stateline: -

"The vein is crossed diagonally by rhyolite and andesite dykes. At the in-tersections are the strongest ore bod-The ore generally averages 4 feet tes. The ore generally averages 4 feet in width, though some shoots are 16 feet wide. The gangue consists of quartz-porphyry. The values are prin-cipally gold and silver. The main shaft is down 300 feet, and drifts have been run on the 200 and 300 levels, making 850 feet of development on the vein. At a point 570 feet west of the main shaft an incline has been sunk 240 feet on the dip. Pumps on the third level and in the incline keep the mine clear of water and furnish more than is required for mill work.

"The ore is dumped over a grizzly, thence goes to a McCulley crusher that reduces it to 1%-inch. Two 5-stamp batterios, each stamp weighing 1,050 pounds, and dropping 6 inches 100 per minute, reduce the ore to pass a No. 9 diagonal slotted screens (equivalent to 40 mesh). Below each battery is an amaigamated plate in three sections. The recovery by the plates amounts to 70 per cent of the gold, and a small per cent of the silver. The pulp passes from the plates through quicksilver traps to
