LOCAL BRIEFS.

First Snow of Winter—Reports from Spanish Fork canyon state that it had been snowing up there for several days.

Bigger Edition—The Bell Telephone company published a \$300 directory, the first of this month, covering the Salt Lake & Ogden district.

Collegiate Institute—The Salt Lake Collegiate Institute has 26 students this year, 45 of them being boarders. This is a better record than for years past.

Fund Raising Expedition—Rev. Drs. McNeice and Stevenson of Westminster college are in the way raising funds for the completion of the buildings already up and for the erection of another.

Twenty Years of Presbyterianism—According to Presbyterian records, 2,000 persons have been received into the Utah Presbyterian churches during the last 20 years "on profession of faith," and about the same number by letter.

Paying off Church Debt—Of the \$10,000 subscribed on the debt of the First Methodist church in this city last spring, over \$4,000 has been paid, with the interest up-to-date. The subscriptions were made payable on or before next January.

Mrs. Leonard Convalescent—Mrs. F. E. Leonard has sufficiently recovered from a capital operation at the Keogh-Hammond hospital to be returned to her home where she is convalescing rapidly. Mrs. Leonard has many friends who will be pleased to hear this.

Heavy Idaho Business—Local express agents report an unusual amount of business, shipments being of all kinds of merchandise. A great deal of this is going into mining, which the express people regard as one of the most remarkable states in the Union in the way of development.

Thrills for Bank Clerks—The Salt Lake Chapter of the American Institute of Bank Clerks held their monthly evening meeting at the Commercial club. President Q. B. Keith will relate his thrilling trip through the northwest, including several hairbreadth escapes from railroad accidents.

Improvements at Cemetery—The Mt. Olivet association has just expended \$2,500 in improving and laying out new lands, increasing the acreage of the cemetery 30 per cent. A thousand new trees have been set out, cement paths laid, and new roadways opened. The management proposes to have in a few years one of the finest cemeteries in the west.

Somewhat Embarrassing—There are two H. L. Thomas in town, and since one H. L. Thomas barely escaped being sent to jail for refusing to answer questions in court, the other H. L. Thomas has been stopped on the street any number of times to be offered congratulations on his escape from imprisonment in the county baseline.

New Telephone Line—The Utah & Nevada telephone company is extending its line into Skull valley from this city, 75 miles, and the construction is promised for the 1st of November. The people of this somewhat remote region are much gratified at the prospect, as it has often happened in the past that quick communication with Salt Lake would have saved suffering, and sometimes lives.

Governor in Demand—Governor William Spy has received invitations to attend three conventions this fall and appoint delegates to represent the state of Utah. The Dry Farming congress which will be held in Billings, Montana, on Oct. 25 to 28, inclusive, wants 20 delegates. The Mississippi-to-Atlantic inland waterway convention meets at Jacksonville, Fla., on Nov. 1 and 2. Governor Spy is invited to attend and bring his delegates. The American Road Builders' association holds its meeting at Columbus, O., on Oct. 26 and 27. Governor Spy and three delegates are invited to attend.
