During the week there were 139,051 shares of stock sold on the stoor of the Salt Lake Stock & Mining exchange, and for the same a total of \$37,407.61 were checked out.

The Daiy stocks are still depressed, investors apparently waiting the outcome of the clearing of the obstruction in the Ontario drain tunnel.

CREAT BIG BREAK OCCURS IN MAY WHEAT.

Chicago, April 22.-In less than five minutes today the price of May wheat fell three cents per bushel. Following the severe decline Thursday during the last previous trading the break today was taken by many traders as further confirmation that the famous deal by John W. Gates in May wheat was practically at an end. At the opening May was off 1 to 2 cents at 1.08% 1.09. Following almost immediate sales were made at 1.07. In a short time the decline today amounted to 5 cents a bushel, equalling the total of Thursday's break. Intense excitement accompanied the sensational drive of prices, but comtrading was relatively small. From 1.07 the price of the May option unin-terruptedly declined to 1.05.

Before the session was half over another 2 cents had been snapped off the price of the May option. Practically there were no fluctuations, the quotations for May making an almost sheer descent to 1.03 a bushel as against 1.10. Thursday's closing figures, and 1.13%, the high point on Thursday.
