SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY,

The air at the earth's surface is found to contain 21 per cent of oxygen, 78 of nitrogen, .03 of carbon dioxide. .94 of argon, .01 of helium, and .02 of hy-drogen. From data supplied, by Gau-tler, Dalton and Laplace, Dr. Gustavus Hinnichs has calculated the proportions of these gases in the air at increasing totakie and finds that has must distin heights, and finds that we must distinguish five strata or separate atmos-pheres. The lowest atmosphere, con-taining the aqueous vapor, clouds and carbonic acid, reaches a height of 12 miles. The oxygen atmosphere extends beyond this to 30 miles, when the proportion of oxygen falls to less than 10 per cent. The nitrogen at this point rises to 86 per cent, gradually diminishing to 4 per cent at 60 miles. Then follows the helium atmosphere, where helium reaches its maximum of 16 per cent. This gradually gives way to hy-drogen, which at 100 miles forms 90 per cent of the air, and in the upper layers of the atmosphere is the only gas pres-

Berthelot, however, is cited as an eminent believer, and he is stated to foresee both artificial meat and artificial bread.
