

A French column under Logert has entered Tunisian territory without opposition, and encamped between the frontier and Kef.

The jury in the case of Mrs. Howe, the so-called Ladies Deposit, Boston, returned a verdict of guilty. The case will go up on exceptions.

The steamship *Victoria* of the Anchor Line, from, has arrived at Y., and is quarantined, with several cases of small-pox in the steerage.

Glasgow papers state that Catherine Marshall, aged 14, daughter of a railway laborer, has not taken food since the beginning of the present year.

Gladstone notifies Bradlaugh that he will object to his taking the oath unless Bradlaugh makes a statement removing the objections of members.

A number of leading republicans, Vice-President Arthur and Senator Platt, had a conference to-day on local matters and the situation in Washington.

The French troops at the disposal of the Bey of Tunis, for the purpose of maintaining order in the European quarter of the city, have been declined by the Bey.

Craig Mitchell, a colored voodoo practitioner, was arrested in Louisville, to-day, charged with outraging a girl 14 years of age, at Frankfort, who died from the effects.

A half an hour fire in the Oriental Mills, at Providence, R. I., owned by the heirs of Alfred A. Reed, and running on print cloth, caused a damage of \$75,000. insured.

The Sultan has approved all the measures the Bey has lately adopted and negotiations have been opened with the Powers to protect the rights of the Sultan and Bey.

It is understood that Minister Marsh has asked to be recalled from Rome, in which event his successor would most likely be Dr. M. Gregory, of the Illinois Agricultural College.

McKee Rankin and Manager Sheppard, of the Grand Opera House, had a lively fist fight in the latter's office, at Toronto, to-day. Sheppard had Rankin arrested, but he was released.

Minister Hilliard will soon be recalled from Brazil, and John C. White, of Chicago, be Charge d'Affairs until the President can secure the confirmation of ex-Congressman Munro, of Ohio.

The Russian police, hoping to wring a confession from Hersy Helfmann, left her without food forty-eight hours. She had several fainting spells, but refused to give any information.

Another audacious address to the Czar has been issued by the Nihilists, pointing out that the execution of those concerned in the assassination only served to strengthen the ranks of the Nihilists.

President Davis, of the South Pacific Coast Narrow Gauge Railroad, denies that the property has been sold to the Atlantic and Pacific Company, or that negotiations have been had to that effect.

The Governor General of Canada on Sunday afternoon, drove up the Gatineau some distance, and his horses ran away, but in descending a hill the pole became detached and his Excellency was rescued.

On June 13th, Rear-Admiral Rogers will become superintendent of the Naval Academy, relieving Rear-Admiral Balch, who will proceed to San Francisco to take command of the naval force on the Pacific station.

Fremantle, deputy Master and Comptroller of the English Royal Mint, was elected to represent England at the monetary conference. It is said he has been instructed to simply take notes and report to his government.

Lieutenant Lockwood, of the 11th Infantry, who was the third officer selected to accompany Lieutenant Greely on his expedition to Lady Franklin Bay, has concluded not to go, and it is understood the vacancy will not be filled.

The *Quarterly Review* contains a slashing attack on Carlyle, believed to be from the pen of Abraham Hayward. The writer condemns those who seek to raise busts and statues to men of genius, whose works are in open defiance of good sense, good feeling and good taste.

The governors of Kewf and Lieja have asked instructions from the Bey, and have been ordered to surrender to the French under protest.

The circuit court of Pennsylvania has made a decree restraining the Reading Railway Company from issuing the 150,000,000 blanket mortgage bonds.

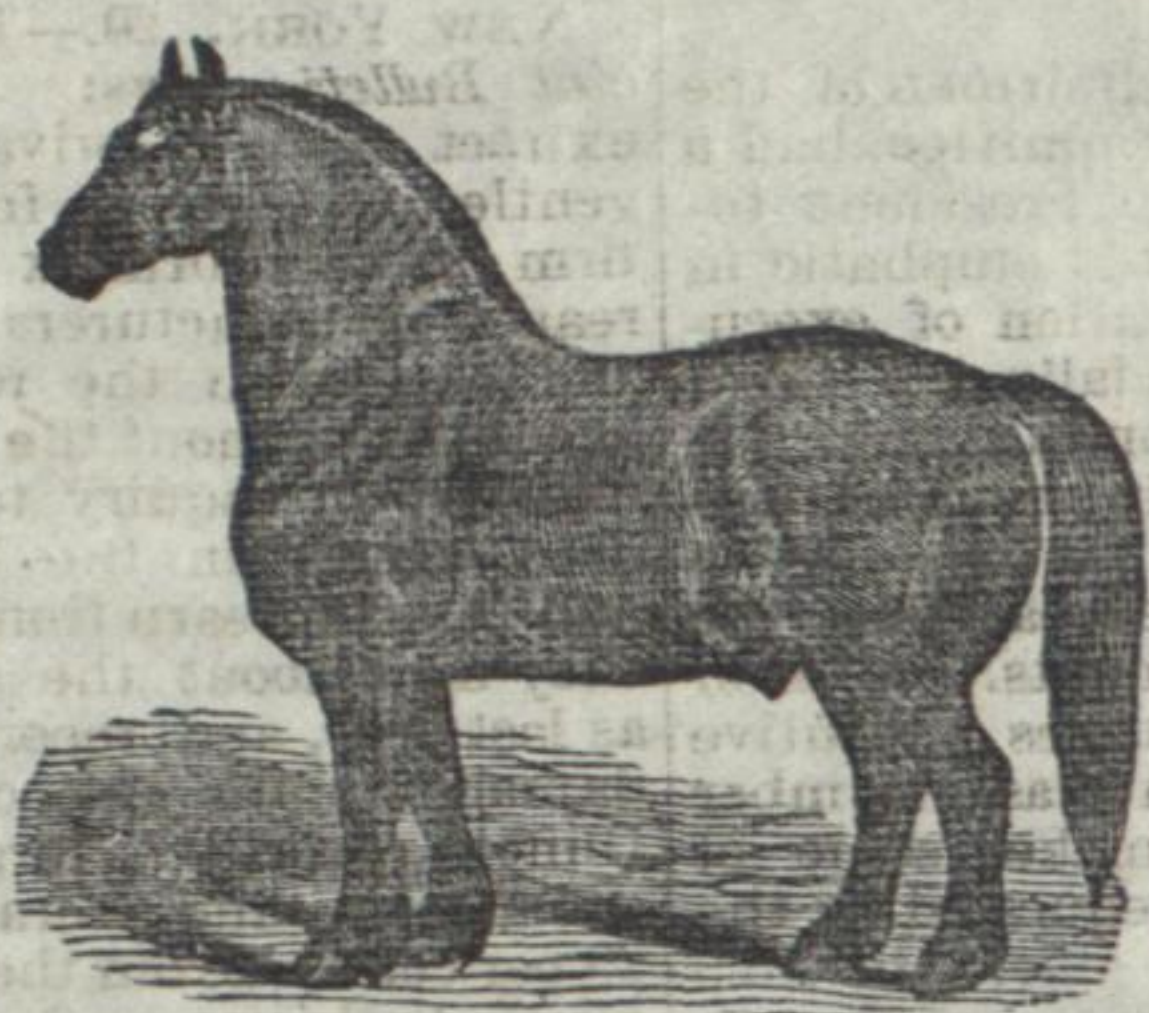

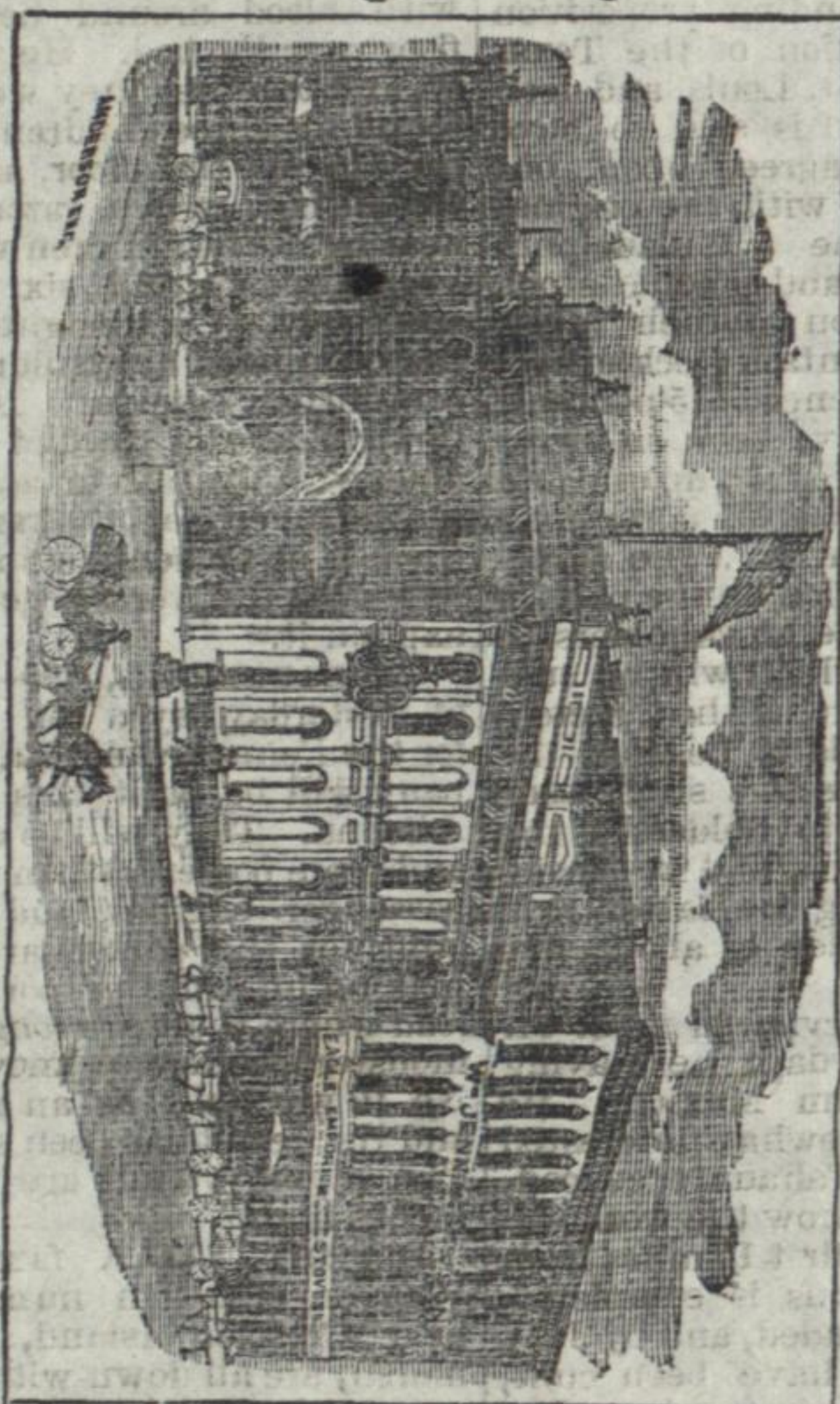
