BIG INCREASE IN BANK CIRCULATION.

Washington, Dec. 1 .- The monthly circulation statement issued by the omptroller of the currency shows that at the close of business on Nov. 30 1905, the total amount of national ban 1905, the total amount of national bank notes in circulation was \$533.329.258, an increase for the year of \$72,650.152, an increase for the month of \$8,821,009. The amount of circulation based on United States bonds was \$497,616,304, an increase for the year of \$69,668,109 and an increase for the month of \$7,-578,498.
