Mount Pleasant: cloudy, and looks like going to storm, six inches of snow. Ephraim: snowing all night, mild with two inches of snow this morning. Gunnison: cloudy and cold, about three inches of snow. Round Valley: wind blowing from the north very cold, snow four inches deep. Fillmore: snowed most of the night, cloudy and cold, snow four inches deep. Dove Creek: mild but cloudy, four inches of snow. Beaver: clear but cold, snowed last night. Farowan: cold and cloudy, snowed last night. St. George: mild and pleasant, roads dry and dusty. Thermometer 50°.
