RAPID TRANSIT ROAD FOR SALE

Capital Stock to be Increased to Half Million and Extensions Consummated.

O'NEILL COMPANY SUES CITY.

Fight for Lower Insurance Rates—Interurban Bus—Junction City News Briefs.

Ogden, June 13.—Many times during the past week various newspapers circulating in Ogden have published stories of the reported sale of the Ogden Rapid Transit company to the Harriman interests. An official of the company denied the sale but said that the road like anything else was for sale either to Mr. Harriman or any other official or corporation who would pay the price.

In further discussing the road, the official said that the Ogden Rapid Transit and the Ogden & Northwestern companies were going to combine with a capital stock of \$500,000. The Northwestern, which is composed of the same stockholders as the Rapid Transit company, operates the road from the city limits to the Hot Springs, and since it has been electrified the Ogden Rapid Transit company cars run from the city direct to the springs.

The two roads are capitalized for \$500,000 at the present time and the sale of additional stock will give the company a surplus with which to build the many contemplated extensions of the street car line in the city and the Hot Springs line to Brigham City, as has been contemplated for some time.

SUIT AGAINST CITY.

O'Neill Construction Co.'s Claim Disputed by City Officers.

Ogden, June 13.—The case of the J. P. O'Neill Construction company against the City Auditor Florence O. Stanford and City Recorder E. P. Brown to compel them to issue a warrant for \$4,427.79 which the company claims for work done for the city for improvement work.

It is urged by the attorneys for the city that the action taken by the city council in allowing the claim last year was done under a misapprehension. As Judge Maginnis, attorney for the plaintiff, expressed it while arguing a motion before Judge Howell yesterday, the "council didn't know what they were about."

The construction company's claim of \$4,427.79 less a partial payment, it is alleged was approved and ordered paid by the council. A few days later it was approved by former Mayor E. M. Conroy. Subsequently instructions were given by city officials to refuse payment on the claim as a mistake had been discovered. The former mayor claimed that he had signed the claim, which was not entirely approved.

The new council approved the claim when it came before that body, but Mayor Brewer disapproved the claim and attached his veto to the measure. The company is now seeking to collect in court.

INTERURBAN GETTING IN TOWN.

Next Tuesday morning it is expected that the railroad crossing of the Bamberger road over the Union Pacific at Thirty-first street and Pacific avenue will be put in after the final arrangements are completed between the representatives of the Bamberger and the Harriman roads. When this is done it will only be a few more days before the Bamberger trains then can enter the city.
