Base Ball.—The opening game of the season played on Washington Square, Saturday afternoon, drew out quite a large crowd, notwithstanding the usual admission fee was charged. The Fort Douglas nine are quite a strong organization, and played very carefully, but in spite of their efforts, the game was finally won by the Salt Lake boys by a score of 12 to 13.

Bishop Clawson's Examination.—On Saturday afternoon Bishop H. B. Clawson appeared at Commissioner McKay's office at the time appointed for the examination. A large number of witnesses, members of the Bishop's family and others, were also present. The Commissioner read the complaint, and asked the accused whether he was guilty or not guilty. To which Mr. Clawson replied, "Mr. Commissioner, it is not necessary to examine any witnesses in this case. I admit the facts as set forth in the complaint." The defendant's bonds were placed at \$1,000, to await the action of the grand jury, his former bondsmen continuing as sureties. Mrs. Emily Y. Clawson was subpoenaed, while in the Commissioner's office, to appear before the grand jury on the 18th of May.

THE PROSECUTION.

PRESIDENT A. M. CANNON'S TRIAL—THE EMPOWERING OF THE JURY.

The Third District Court room was crowded this morning at the opening hour, by many who were desirous of witnessing the proceedings in the trial of President A. M. Cannon, charged with unlawful cohabitation with his wives. A large number of witnesses were in attendance in the case, and also several for the case of Elder A. M. Musser, which was set for to-day.

Messrs. F. S. Richards, Bennett, Harkness & Kirkpatrick, Sutherland & McDonald, all appeared for the defendant, and Messrs. Dickson and Varian for the prosecution. The defendant had entered a plea of not guilty, and the following names of jurors were called:

Arthur Brown, Esq., examined the jury on the part of the defense. Peter Clays, of Brigham had heard and read of the case, was acquainted with the defendant, but had formed no opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the accused. He knew nothing of the facts.

A. W. Carlson had heard and read of the case, and had formed an opinion. Mr. Richardson, Esq., examined the jury on the part of the defense. Peter Clays, of Brigham had heard and read of the case, was acquainted with the defendant, but had formed no opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the accused. He knew nothing of the facts.

John C. Mackey and H. S. Beale, Jr., had both read the newspaper in relation to the matter, but had formed no opinion. James T. Smith had read the papers, and did not know exactly whether he had an opinion or not.

Wm. D. Palmer had only seen the heading of the articles published concerning the case, and had formed no opinion. C. D. Brinton and Phil Klippe had read the account in the papers, but had formed no opinion.

E. R. Clute was challenged by the defense for having an unequal opinion, and was excused. A. W. Carlson was challenged by the prosecution for bias, and he was excused.

Mr. Dickson then interrogated the jurors for the prosecution. John C. Mackey was acquainted with the defendant, was a member of the same Church, and believed it to be right for a man to have more than one wife at a time.

Mr. Brown objected to the questions and challenges, as this was not a polygamy case. Mr. Dickson said a believer in polygamy was not competent to sit in any of these cases.

The Judge sustained the challenge and Mr. Mackey was excused. H. S. Beale, Jr., and Jas. T. Smith both read the newspaper in relation to the matter, but had formed no opinion. Wm. D. Palmer was a married man. He was not a member of the same Church as the defendant, and he had been, nor his wife, nor their "sisters" or their cousins or their aunts, or any other relatives. He did not believe it right for a man to have more than one wife at a time.

Phil Klippe had never been connected with the "church," nor had his family. He did not believe it right for a man to have more than one wife at a time.

Court met at 2 p. m. The following names of jurors were called: 102 H. A. Woolley, 80 Orson P. Romney, 191 W. N. Clark, R. S. Wells and Joseph A. Silver were not present.

W. M. Clark was not a tax-payer, but had a watch as taxable property. Messrs. Woolley, Romney and Clark had heard and read of the case, but had formed no opinion thereon.

On examination by the prosecution it appeared that H. A. Woolley and Orson P. Romney were members of the same Church as the defendant, and they were accordingly excused. W. M. Clark was not a member of the Church, nor was any of his family such, and he believed it wrong to practice polygamy. He was sworn as a juror.

Two more names were called. 155 Wm. E. Jacobs, 42 James H. Foutson. Wm. E. Jacobs had expressed an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the defendant, but not fixed or positive. Had talked to a number of parties on the subject. Had now an opinion, and believed it to be wrong to change. Had bias in the case. Challenged and excused.

On being questioned by Mr. Dickson it was learned that Mr. Foutson was on friendly terms with defendant. Was a member of the Church of Latter-day Saints, and believed it to be right for a man to have more than one wife at a time. Excused.

Mr. Davis was not a taxpayer, but had taxable personal property. Thomas Davis and Jos. DeWidge had heard and read of the case, but had not formed an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the defendant. By Mr. Dickson—Mr. DeWidge was acquainted with the defendant. Was prejudiced in his favor. Challenged and excused.

Mr. Davis did not believe it right for a man to have more than one wife at a time, or to live in unlawful cohabitation, and was sworn. 4 George F. Price was called. He had heard of the case, but had not expressed an opinion. Challenged and excused.

In answer to Mr. Dickson, Mr. Price said he was a member of the Church and accepted its teachings. Believed in plural marriage. Excused. By Mr. Dickson—Mr. Wells was acquainted with defendant. Was a member of the Church, and believed it to be right for a man to have more than one wife. Excused.

It appearing by the Marshal's return that three of the names drawn had not been served, and the rest of the list being exhausted, the officer explained that he had been unable to find the three omitted. Mr. Brown moved that the return be quashed, because it was incomplete. Motion overruled. Exception taken. The same objection was made to the drawing of more names. Overruled. The following names were drawn from the box, the venire returnable at 4 p. m.:
