## MAUDLIN SYMPATHY FOR MURDERERS.

"The sickening attentions and solicitations cast bestowed upon murderers condemned to suffer the death penalty, strongly illustrate the grotesque side of sentimental sympathy. To those who, like Oliver Brown, would tell us 'How to escape Hell,' the commission of murder might be suggested as the most recent improvement. The more brutal the act, and the more horrible the details, the greater the consideration will be the criminal receives, and when the end is near, he has but to profess piety, enjoy a good night's rest, and a heavy meal, hear his favorite (?) hymn sung for the last time, receive his enemies, and die with the happy assurance that all will be well with him upon the other side of the dark river. The maudlin spirit of mingled contrition and dissimulation in which the 'last words' are uttered, and the eagerness with which they are received by the tender hearts around the scaffold, is, we believe, without exception, the most revolting feature of modern society."

We clip the above editorial remarks from the Cincinnati Commercial. They truthfully describe the conduct of the ministers of the day, and the maudlin sympathy they indulge in, towards murderers. If we were to believe all the stories that are published concerning murderers who have been hung, we should imagine that Heaven is populated with that class; for, in almost every instance, they die full of religious fervor, singing hymns and uttering rhapsodies concerning Heaven and proclaiming their love for the Lord. It is only recently that a man in New England, who had committed an abominable murder, expressed a wish to have a quartette of young ladies, whose singing pleased him, present at his execution, that he might listen to their sweet and melodious strains as he stepped into eternity. Another poor wretch shrieked, as the drop was about to fall: "I see my Father! welcome to King Jesus! the gates are open to receive me." Of another it is said he exclaimed: "I want to go right away! Jesus will give me bread and meat!" It is recorded of another that he said: "I'm on my way to Canaan!" The latter had murdered his wife and then killed his mistress.

On the 12th inst. a man by the name of Bell, who had seduced a wife and murdered the husband, was hung in the State of Illinois, and a Rev. Dr. Dew, a minister of the Methodist Episcopal church, who was present at his execution, prayed for him. He besought the Lord to grant unto the criminal grace "in this his hour of need." He implored Heaven that the culprit might realize that "Thou art with him, to uphold, comfort and sustain him in this his dying hour. May he look beyond the death which he is called to die—look beyond the confines of the tomb to that inheritance which is incorruptible, undefiled and that fades not away reserved in Heaven for him. O Lord, we leave him in Thy hands, trusting in Thee for his salvation. Save him, and save him now! May he, like one of old, exclaim: 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.'"

And this man professes to be a teacher of religion! He would put the sentiment of the Martyr Stephen, a holy servant of God, into the mouth of a villainous murderer.

Is it any wonder that men commit crime when they read these dying speeches, and the prayers and sentiments which are offered in the behalf of murderers by so-called ministers of religion? It is absolutely offering a premium for crime. Who, that is familiar with the many newspaper accounts, which appear from time to time, of the execution of murderers, can recollect of a solitary instance of a man suffering the extreme penalty of the law without some sectarian minister telling him that he was booked for glory, and had a through ticket to the pearly gates of the golden city, where he would dwell eternally in the presence of God and the Lamb? Yet these same ministers frequently express doubts about the future condition of moral, upright, truthful and honest men, whose lives have never been stained by crime, because they do not happen to have them or one of their class to pray for and with them in their last sickness.

The apostle John says, and he is a good authority on this subject: "Ye know that no murderer hath eternal abiding place in him."

We are decidedly of John's conviction in relation to the matter; and if the Rev. Dr. Dew and the rest of the "Christian" ministers who pray so fervently with murderers, promising them the eternal joys of Heaven, desire to have such characters for their associates throughout eternity, we have no objection; but the Latter-day Saints do not like such company in Saints do not like it, and if they should, life, brief as it is, and if they have decided, objection, they would have decided, objection, they are cating with this class in the at-asso-

## By Telegraph.

San Francisco, 19.—The California Immigrant Union will soon appoint agents to the principal cities of Europe.

Another tin mine has been discovered a few miles north of San Bernardino. The ore is pronounced to be superior to that of San Jacinto.

The line of the Virginia City and Truckee railroad was inaugurated yesterday by an excursion to Carson City. The road has commenced carrying ore to Yellow Jacket Mill, Empire City.

The heavy rains have caused great damages in Oregon; the rivers are overflowing the country and threaten to inundate Oregon. The Central railroad bridge over Clackamas river was carried away by the floods.

Arizona states that the expedition under Col. Barnard was recently repulsed by the Indians, but had been reinforced from Camp Bowie.

The eminent Mowry silver mines, that have been closed and in the hands of the military for years, are about to be re-opened. Flour quiet at from \$4.37 1/2 to \$5.50; Legal tenders 25 1/2.

San Francisco, 19.—At Honolulu, on Nov. 2nd, there was a large meeting to consider the subject of Coolie emigration. Resolutions strongly condemnatory of the importation of Coolies were passed.

Reports have been circulated of earthquake on the Kona coast. A bright light was observed on the slopes of Mauna Loa and singular tides visited Hilo Bay and along the coast of Hawaii.

Important commercial news from the Arctic whaling fleet, of Sept. 20, states that the water was literally filled with whales; but the weather was intensely cold. The whalers arrived at Honolulu from the Arctic seas with the following cargoes: Kohola, 800 barrels of oil, 15,000 of bone; Ootelo, 1,250 barrels of oil, 14,000 of bone; Mowee, 1,000 of oil, 120 of sperm oil, with 17,000 of bone; Ootelo, 1,000 of oil, 15,000 of bone; Whaler, first, 1,300 of whale and 100 of sperm oil and 25,000 of bone; J. J. Thompson, 900 of oil and 13,000 of bone; Eagle, 1,400 of whale, 25 of sperm and 24,000 of bone; Mrs. Elliot, from Ochoa, 100 of sperm, 100 of cocoon and 450 of whale and 2,000 of bone.

The Sea Breeze was damaged forward; the Heber Swan, rudder split; the Vincent Stone was leaking badly when last seen and was in the hands of the Japanese, who, it is supposed, will bring her to Honolulu. The O'Neil was lost at Cape Franklin.

POTTSVILLE, SCHUYLKILL CO., Pa., 1st Nov. 1892.

President Brigham Young:—Dear Brother.—Myself and Elder George Mooser have labored mostly in Schuylkill and Luzerne counties, amongst the Saints, and also seeking after those that are scattered through the coal regions of Pennsylvania. Two branches of the Church were organized by Elders Brown and Stewart, one at this place—Pottsville, and the other at Hyde Park, Luzerne Co., Pennsylvania.

I have the pleasure to say, that both of these branches are in a prosperous condition, the Saints feel well, and rejoice in the blessings of God. We still find a few who believe our testimony, and go forth with humble hearts and obey the same, for which we feel to thank our Heavenly Father. I have also the pleasure to say, that many of the prejudices that once existed amongst the people against the Latter-day Saints, have given room to better feelings. There is an inquiry to know something about the faith and practices of the Latter-day Saints. The Saints have rented halls for worship, and in Hyde Park the house is generally filled.

We held a small conference in Pottsville on the 25th day of October. The house was well filled, and we enjoyed much of the spirit of God in our meetings. The authorities of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, in all the world, were presented before the Saints, and were unanimously sustained.

The Church at Pottsville consists of fifty-five members. We have baptized thirteen, and there are a few more applicants to be baptized in a short time.

The kingdom is on ward and the work of the latter days is spreading its light through all the dark regions of Secularism, in fulfillment of ancient and modern prophecies.

Myself and Elder Mooser are well and feel well.

I work continues with the brethren through this winter, most, if not all will be able to emigrate this coming season.

MOSCOW, SANFORD CO., ALA., 20th Oct. 1892.

Pres. Joseph Smith:—Dear Bro.—The demoralizing influences consequent upon war are visible in all circles. There seems to be a stagnation in all branches of business.

In the rural districts the amount of staple land has greatly diminished since the close of the war. Both dwelling and out-houses present the appearance of dilapidation and decay; very little or no improvements whatever going on. Corn and cotton are the principal products of this land. The long drought and incessant heat, the heavy rains and August have cut short the yield. Farmers will have to be economical and saving to have corn to last them till another harvest, and many will fail to be thus blessed. There are but few who are not in debt to the amount of their entire crop, and in many instances the merchants have been on the crop before it is grown; and the planter is forced to go to the merchant for his supply of boots, shoes, groceries, etc., thus keeping him one year behind.

The cotton crop this season will average about 400 lbs of seed cotton per acre. In most of the apples have rotted on the tree. The peach crop has been a failure; but the small fruits, such as grapes and Apples yielded from one to two bushels per acre.

Large quantities of cotton have been prevalent in these parts years has destroyed season, thereby making them command high

prices. Seldom one will see a beef on the range that would be possible in our Utah market; and there is a very small amount of sheep in proportion to the number of inhabitants.

There is quite a spirit in the people to emigrate west, mostly to Texas. There seems to be a fearful looking for something, or some great change or event to take place in political affairs; but the smartest and wisest of men are at a loss to know what is wrong or tell what will make things right, and cause the blessings that they once enjoyed in this land to return to them again.

We often tell them what has caused this state of things, by referring them to the rise and progress of the Kingdom of God, under the direction, care and supervision of the Prophet Joseph Smith. [The nation's rejection of these great, grand and sacred principles, revealed and brought to light through him; the persecution and abuse heaped on the Saints of the Most High God; and that, too, by the inhabitants of this once happy and glorious land.]

The glorious Constitution that granted the right and privilege to all to worship God as seemed good in their own sight, with none to molest; and notwithstanding all this, we see the Prophet submit to law and order, and place himself with his brethren under the pledged faith of the sovereign State of Illinois—Thomas Ford, Governor, incarcerated and imprisoned, deprived of his liberty, and then, with his brother Hyrum, martyred in cold blood; and the rulers of the nation winked at the deed, and afterwards allowed the Church and kingdom of God to be persecuted, and finally driven from the United States, to seek an asylum in the wilderness, with a hope that all who did not sicken and die would starve to death or fall victims to the savage Indians.

The spirit of hatred and persecution towards the servants of God still prevails with the hiring priests and the religious bigots and fanatics, who are always ready to raise the hue and cry, "false prophets," "delusion," etc., and, at the same time, take special pains to keep their "reverend" persons at a good distance, as not to come in contact with us on the doctrine and principles of the gospel contained in the Bible. We have directly, or indirectly, challenged them all in this section of the county to talk, converse or debate with me on religious subjects; but they will not face us. On the 2nd of this month, as I was returning from Columbus, Miss., I called at a relative of mine and stopped all night. The next morning some of the members of the family invited me to accompany them to the camp meeting that was to be held in the neighborhood. I concluded to do so, as I was expecting Bro. A. R. Beard to return from Monroe Co., Miss., and join me near that place, and I had no appointment to fill for a few days. I attended the meeting two days, taking some few notes each day. On the 3rd day Bro. Beard arrived. We both visited the camp ground. Shortly after taking my seat one of the "reverend" gentlemen, waited on me, and told me not to sit in the congregation and take notes again. In the meantime the high sheriff of the county had been sent for. He is an intelligent, interesting young man, and a friend of ours. The young man had been present, so when the warrant was issued he would be compelled to arrest me for disturbing the meeting by taking notes, as one of the preachers alleged. They finally concluded not to issue the warrant, but to present me to the grand jury at the next term of the court, which will be the 5th Monday in Nov. It has been said that I will be indicted at that court for preaching and defending the principle of a plurality of wives, as being in accordance with the mind, will and law of God to life people and church. It is quite probable that I will try my hand at pleading law, as well as preaching plurality, as my money is scarce, and I cannot fee a lawyer; but feel competent to plead my own case. I preached at the county site once, but the court house was closed. The next time I think the doors will be opened to me.

Brother Joseph Mathews has returned from Mississippi. He will labor with me in this section a short time, then return to Mississippi again. His health has been very poor; he is gaining as the cool weather advances. Bro. A. R. Beard has been traveling and laboring with me since the first of August. He will leave for the first of next month, as he has accepted of a position in the defense of truth and for the building up of the kingdom of God in this land.

The Saints in this country feel well and are rejoicing in the truth. All who can possibly raise the means are calculating to emigrate to Zion as early next season as practicable. Some who would be glad to go to Utah cannot possibly raise the means to pay their way.

I did not enjoy good health during the incessant hot weather; but my health is improving at this time. I remain your brother in the New and Everlasting Covenant.

TO MAKE PAPER TRANSPARENT.—Artists, architects, land surveyors, and all who have occasion to make use of tracing paper in their professional duties will be glad to know that a paper capable of the transfer of a drawing in ordinary ink, pencil or water colors, and that even a stout drawing paper, can be made as transparent as the thin yellowish paper at present used for tracing purposes. The liquid used is benzine, if the paper be damped with pure and fresh distilled benzine, it at once assumes a transparency, and permits of the tracing being made, and of ink or water colors being used on its surface without any "running." The paper assumes its opacity as the benzine evaporates, and if the drawing is not completed, the requisite portion of the paper must be again damped with the benzine. The transparent calico, on which indestructible tracings can be made, was a most valuable invention, of benzine will prove of service to many branches of the art professions, in allowing the use of stiff paper, formerly only a slight tissue could be used.
