and situated within the forest reserve. The lands in question have been filed upon by a number of citizens of the state and the applications have been approved by the state board of land commissioners. However, the secretary of the interior has not passed title to these lands. The ruling of the super-visor not to allow the applicants for patents any grazing privileges on their claims within the forest reserve is bas-ed on the fact that the state seems not to have the absolute title to the lands in question until the secretary of the interior has granted the title to the state.

The ruling has caused considerable agitation and the case may be tried in court to determine the merits of the ap-

licants' claims. In one instance the Oregon Short Line Railway company has filed on nearly 72,000 acres of land. The land was taken for its valuable coal deposits and

is situated in the grazing district of the reserve. Several local sheep and cattle men secured rights from the rallway com-pany to use its land, 72,000 acres, as pasturage ground this season. Owing to the ruling that permission to cross the range with herds of cattle must be granted through the supervisor's office the lessees were unable to reach the ground belonging to the rallway com-pany. The parties asked permission from the supervisor to cross the range. but were informed that the depart-ment would control the grazing on all lands within the reserve, to which an absolute title had not passed to the state from the United States governthe graduates of the Lehi

The supervisor's ruling will affect many holders of lands which are un-patented and unapproved by the sec-retary of the interior. There are many selections of lands within the reserve made by the State of Utah which are unpatented. It is estimated that sev-eral hundred thousand acres selected by the state hand commissioners will be practically taken back by the de-partment, and no claim to any lands within the reserve will be honored by the supervisor unless said claim has he supervisor unless said claim
