ministry, and subsequently became a Baptist mit ister. That was in 1870. He believed that God never would again speak to man on the earth. But in his experience for twenty years afterwards he felt that there was truth in the testimouy he first heard. At last he felt there was only one thing for him to do-that was to obey the Gospel and take the consequences of doing so. This he did and he has sinc received a strong testimony that this work is true-that it is the work of the living God. He spoke with fervor and much earnestness, and his utterances made a deep impression on the audiener.

The speaker also gave his idea of ancient Apostle was from what an what he had read of them, and said for a long time before he had that privilege he was anious to see a living Apustle, and when he did see onewhen he felt him in the handshake aud beard his voic , there was such a power and influence around him for good that he had never before experienced. That was another testimony to him that it was of God. The first Apostle be ever saw was Franklin D. Richards, He was listened to with the closest attention.

Elder Wm. N. Fife made a few edifying remarks, and related his experience among the Indians while in Ari-Spoke of a recent visit to Mex. ZOD 8. He said the Sainis were in a igo. prosperous condition there, 'fney have good crops of grain, vegetables and They are contented and happy; fruit. they are increasing and will yet be come a numerous and, great people iu Mexico.

The benediction was pronounced by Elder Juseph Stanford.

In the attersoon the opening prayer was offered by Elder W. W. Burton.

Elder S. B. Young read part of the revelation given through the Prophet Joseph Smith, D. c. 23, 1832, concerning the war that w. uld come to pass, f+beginning at the rebellion of South Car-He spoke at length on the olina." causes which contributed to bring causes which contributed to bring about the fulfilment of that great prophecy, and established the great truth that Joseph was a true Propnet. He mentioned numerous events that had transpired since the prediction was made.

Elder Franklin D. Richards gave some additional instruction on the sub-ject. He also reminded the Saints that there is much of the prophecy gives in that revelation which had yet to be fulfilled.

Elder Heber J. Grant said after a prophecy has been fulfilled people tay that it was not given by inspiration. But those who have not the Spirit o' God do not know how these things are ulfilled. It is through the lack of the Spirit of God that people do not under-stand the things of God, and hence they cannot understand prophecy anu its fulfilment. The world cannot units fulfilment. The world cannot un-derstand that the Latter-day Saints are fulfilling prophecy in gathering to these mountains and building houses unto the Lord. This is because they have not the Spirit of God. There is have not the Spint of God. There is more sold comfort and happlness to be found in the religion of the Latter-lay Saints than in any other religion in the world. Latter-Jay Saints than in any asked this from the hands of other religion in the world. He referred to the prophecy of Joseph ne died when Heber J. was hut nice Smith that the Saints would gather to days old. He was, as many will still

these mountains and would build up cities and large communities and thus they would eventually become a powerful people. Much of the prediction has already been fulfilled-wuich no one can deuy, and the remainder will be consummated. He referred at length to the persecutions of the Saints both in the states add in Utah, and the manuer in which they have been deprived of so much of their property by the government. But, said he, there are set times for the Lord to favor Zion, and this is one of them, for He has caused the government to restore to the Courch some of the property, and the time may come when the United States will be called upon to account for the remainder of the protecty of which this people have been wrung-fully despoiled. He also spike on the Word of Wisdom, and said there is no xcuse for our not rendering obedience to that Word and Will of the Lord. He exhorted to be true to God, to themselves and the covenants which they made with the Lord.

The choir saog and the meeting closed with prayer by Elder Fjelsted.

At the close of the afterucon service a Seventies conference was held, at which much valuable instruction was given and a number of important questions were answered pertaining to the duties of the seventies.

Monday morning there was a good sized congregation. After singing by the choir, and prayer by Bishop James Faylor, Elder H. J. Grant addressed the Baints. On the afternoon previous he stated that he expected to speak this morning to empty benches; but he now confessed that he was happly and cratefully disappointed at seeing so large an assembly, notwithstanding the great attraction that was to the city -the large circus. This spoke well for the Latter-day Saints in this Stake. When we come together to serve the Lord with prayerful hearts we will not go away without a blessing. He re-erred to the remarks of Elder Fjeisted on Sunday. He endorsed them, He believed that the blessings which we oow enjoy in this life are the resulte of the conditions and conduct of our lives in a previous state of existence. Hesaid the faithful labors we perform and the lotegrity of our hearts in this lite will secure to us sternal life hereafter. It is not knowledge alone that will save us, but the faithful application of that knowledge to build up the purposes of God and establish Hi-work on the earth. Elder Grant reialed some of the experiences at the time he was called to be an Apcstle of Jesus Christ, 'He lelt unworthy of such a high and holy calling, and was dis-posed to decime the call. After his ordination he still feit that be ought put to have accepted the responsible office.

While riding along on his journey, subsequently, and still pondering upou the matter he termed a visitation-it seemed as if some one was walking beside him and a voice said to him, "you need not trouble any more about the reason why you were called to be an Apostle. It was not on account of your own worthiness, but in response to the request of your father, who has

remember, a good, true and faithful servant of God. He habored incesservant of God. He hobored luces-santly and fervently to build up, purify and establish the saints in the fuith of the Gospel. He was literally woro out in the services of the Lord. It will thus be seen that after they pass benind the veil, our parents watch over us and are solicitous for our welfare. Elder C. D. Fjelsted made some very

excellent remarks on the solicitude of parents for the good and salvation of the children. Heexborted the Baints to store up the knowledge and wise counsels they have received at this conterence.

Elder F. D. Richards said he was much pleased with the remarks of Elder Grant. Spoke of the faith and long labors of Jedediah M. Grant and his endurance through life, and con-firmed the testimony of Hever J. conceruing the blessings the fathers, who have received the Priesthood can proours for their offspring after they have fintshed a faithful career in this life. Spoke of the restoration of the Priestnood and keys held by Moses, Elias, Elijab, which had been cunferred on the Prophet Joseph Bmith for the es-tablishing of the Kingdom of God aud the salvation of the human fami-iy. He gave much fatherly counsel, and advised the Baints to be faithful, to be earnest in all their endeavors to vercome all evil and stand approved before God.

Atter benediction by Elder Richard Bailantyne meeting closed.

In the afternoon the house was again filled. Elder L. W. Shuitliff expressed the great pleasure he felt at the privilege of listening to the rich instructions we have had at the confe suce. He wished he could remember it all, He spoke on the irrigation system and the great blessing it has been to the people. He advised them to adopt meaus to store up the water while they have an opportunity to do so and not let privileges slip cut of their, hands and go into the hands of speculators who would make them pay tribute for their water in the future.

He endorsed all that had been said by the other speakers during the conference, hore testimony to the union that exists in this Church and the hyrmony there is in this Stake of Zion.

Elder F. D. Bighards delivered an excellent discourse replete with instructions appropriate to the present condition of the Saints. Related the circumstance under which the Prophet Joseph and Oliver Cowdery received the Meichisedek Priesthood from Peter, James and John, the endorsement given in the Kutiand and Neuvoo Femples, and in the Femples in Utah. Spoke of the importance of keeping records, advised the people to go to the poles at the proper time and vote for the adoption of the Constitution and secure for ourselves the inestimable boon of Biatebood, etc., etc.

Elder H. J. Grant made a few closing remarks, endorsing those of Elder Shurtliff relative to securing and husbanding water. He advised the people not to waste the water by letting too much of it tun long on their land and washing out its virtues. The choir sang an anthem. After

henediction by Elder N. C. Flygare, conference adjourned.
