Among the reatures of today's cele-bration is the unveiling of a monument, consisting of a rough-hewn shaft on a heavy pedestal, bearing a bronze plate inscribed with the following legend; "Not far from this spot, on the bank of the Little Logan, camped carly in of the Little Logan, camped carly in May, 1859, these first settlers in Logan: Griffith Childs, Abraham Cald-well, Sidney Dibble and wife, and David Reese and wife Martha. In memory of this event, this monument

was erected by the citizens of Logan, May 6, 1909." May 6, 1909." This monument stands near the northeast corner of the Tabernacle square in the center of the city. It is composed of native stone quarried in Logan canyon and is known as Con-glomerate, a combination of quartzity and sandstone.
