## NEW YORK MONEY.

Henry Clews' letter this week says: At the moment, there are two legitimate ways of easing the money market, and either of them is liable to come to our relief any day. One is a decisive battle in South Africa with victory to the British. This would enable us to import gold from London without much resistance. The rate of sterling bills for sight sold down to 4.85 early in the week, but afterwards advanced to 4.86. We can bring gold here at 4.8414. but until the Boers are knocked out the Bank of England and the London bankforts to keep gold from com-ing to this country. In the meantime relief will have to come through a flow of funds from the interior, and the rates of domestic ex. change will soon begin to indicate it, think. So long as we are deprived of these modes of recuperation the money market is liable to remain more or less stringent. I am clearly of the opinion, however,

that the backbone of tight money is now broken, as is the backbone of the Philippine rebellion, and I now also look for a speedy collapse of the South Afri-can war. It will come after the first big victory to the British arms, which may occur at any moment. With Aguinaldo taken prisoner, a big British victory, securing the opening upof the African gold mines, and the easing up of the money market here, the overhanging clouds will all be removed, which will cause very active and increased prosperous business all over the world and especially in this country.

W00L.

The wool market is excited, and prices are steadily advancing. Boston's sales for the week have been about 15,-000,000 pounds, as against 12,000,000 last week and 18,000,000 two weeks ago. The past month's business foots up to over 60,000,000 pounds, which is unprece-dented for that market. As a result of the large demand, prices have been advancing and the stock of wool on hand is getting very low. The deadvancing and the stock of wool on hand is getting very low. The de-mand continues both for speculation and for consumption, most of the pur-chases being for the latter purpose, however. The export demand con-tinues, too, and better prices can be obtained abroad than are ruling here, for, notwithstanding the recent ad-vances this is still the lowest marked vances, this is still the lowest market in the world. Most of the operations are still in territory, Texas and Oregon wools, and other domestic grades. The

The offer did not at that time com-mend itself to the officials of the British admiralty, but the evidence which has since accumulated to prove the superiority of nickel steel over every other kind of armor plate suggests that possibly the time may have now ar-rived when the proposition made to the imperial government eight years ago might be hopefully renewed.

It remains to be seen, however, whether the commissioners of the ad-miralty will accept the offer now made by Ontario. It seems scarcely probable that acceptance would mean the placing of an embarra on the conthe placing of an embargo on the continued export to the United States for naval purposes of the nickel product of the Canadian Copepr Co., which is composed mainly of Judge Stevenson Burk, of Cleveland, and several Ohio capitalists. This company has up to now had a practical monopoly of the supply of nickel for American armor. In the seven years, 1892-1898, the quantity of ore smelled and reduced in the Sudbury district was 591,852 tons

vented from getting nickel even if Great Britain and France should at-temp to control the supply of nickel ore. The principal deposits of the metal are at Sudbury, aCnada, and in New Caledonia, a French island in the Pacific, but nickle is being produced in Oregon and in other parts of the United States. If England and France should refuse to allow their nickel to be sold to other nations it would probably increase the price in the United States, but would not entirely shut off the supply.

#### DREDGERS FOR MONTANA.

#### Five Powerful Dredgers for Grasshopper Creek.

The expenditure of several hundred thousand dollars is promised next year by the Coast Gold Mining company of Philadelphia, which is at present oper-ating a large dredger on Grasshopper creek in Beaverhead county, Montana, The company, it is said, owns ten miles of the creek bed, in which nuggests of pure gold worth from \$4 to \$5 are often found in a pay streak which sometimes runs 20 feet in width.
