Robe gowns in which the embroidery is planned after the style has been decided upon, and the various portions cut and seamed together, are among the leaders of the late summer fashions. An elaborate example of this mode is illustrated in the picture. The costume is a two-piece one, consisting of a short jacket after the bolero order, and a skirt that exhibits the extreme of fashionable fullness. The coat is laid in longwise tucks, and finished all around with two deep bias folds, the length just escaping the waistline and intended to display the smart and loosely fitted corset belt of white satin ribbons. The sleeve is a loose pagoda affair, and the entire little bolero is edged all around on the inside with a plisse and lace-trimmed ruffle of white mousseline. The embroideries take the form of a stole cape, the edges puffing with plisse mousseline, and extending below the coat for some inches. The skirt is a circular design, the top deftly fitted over the hips by means of groups of tiny pinched tucks, all hand run, of course. There is a bias seam in the center front, the embroideries concealing this; and the back is disposed in similar fashion. Worked after a panel design, the cut out embroidery affords a stimulation of a blouse effect, and a group of deeper tucks makes for a form finish at the hem.
