PURE MILK FROM OBSERV-ANCE OF SANITARY RULES

That there is entirely too much care-lessness and lack of proper sanitation observed about the mlik supply dairies there can be no question. The wors phase of unsanitary conditions preval The worst about the city milk supply dairies. The little dairies, in the vicinity of the larger cities, owing to their lack room to properly handle their cows, by large yards and pastures, incline to the confinement plan of the cows, in filthy stables, small pens and muddy Many of these places, in damp vards. and rainy weather, may be smelled at long distance.

The cow yard and the cow stable are hard places to keep free from bad odors under best of conditions, and if per-mitted to go any length of time with-out a thorough cleaning and disinfecting, the conditions become serious-ly contaminating to milk. There is but one sure and safe plan of handling the dairy stable and yards and that is cleaning twice a day, or still better, have the one who attends to the care and feeding of the cows remove all droppings as soon as observed, and and droppings as soon as observed, and opportunity will permit. In this way the cows may be kept free from this source of filth, which is the worst fea-ture of dirt about the dairy. The tendency of carelessness in the milk dairy management demands the strictest abservation of strict sanitary rules. The everyist of the dairies

rules. The oversight of the dairies supplying milk to town or city patrons, by a competent inspector, has become an absolute necessity, in order to se-cure safety to the children and delicate persons, who are most susceptible to milk contamination by disease

germs Healthy cows, when supplied with proper feed and kept, under good sanitary surroundings, will give healthy milk. Then why not require these conditions of milk supply to exist and in-sure the patrons of the town and city milk supply, a clean, healthy product? They pay a big price for it, and should join in a demand for what their money

is supposed to guarantee to them. The Utah Condensed Milk company has given out to its patrons a set of rules and regulations defining its demands in the milk to be furnished for its use, as follows: 1. Patrons must thoroughly clean

out cow stables twice a day before milking.

2. Immediately after cleaning out stables, the trenches must be bedded with sawdust, horse manure, chaff, lime

or some absorbent. 3. Milking must be done cleanly without wetting or moistening the cow's teats.

4. Milk is not permitted to remain in the cow stable after milking for any time, however short.

Cans and all milking utensils must be kept sweet and clean by patrons. 6. Immediately after milking, milk must be placed in tank or vat of cold water with four times as much water as milk, and kept till moved to the

factory. 7. If necessary in summer season, ice must be used in said tank or vat. 8. Milk while in transit must be kept covered with clean woolen blankets or canvas.

All milk haulers are expected to help dump their milk. 10. The milk inspector is to have

free access to the stables, milk houses, etc., at all seasonable hours.

11. The milk inspector is to be per-mitted to assist, if he desires, in milking , and taking samples for testing

purposes. 12. Any one wishing to withhold part or all of their milk, must first get permission from the superintendent. 13. Milk kept at home for family purposes must be taken at time of

milking. 14. No milk of any kind is allowed
