

A contract was signed today for 300 feet of shaft work on the Silver Bow property in Tintic district. The Silver Bow adjoins the Silver Park and the ledge of the latter extends into its ground. This has been shown by the incline shaft which was run down on the vein a distance of 300 feet. While the work of sinking the new working shaft goes on the old incline shaft will be put down 100 feet further. A lease was signed today whereby certain parties have agreed to do the work for the ore that is extracted. About \$15,000, it said, has been expended on the property.

THE NEW PASS MINE.

Fred Mitchell and P. T. Farnsworth's Nevada Mines Turning Out Well.

Fred Mitchell is in from the New Pass mine, Nev., on one of his periodi-cal trips. Mr. iMtchell brought the result of the last clean-up with him in the shape of a gold brick worth about \$1,700. Nothing sensational has occurred at the mine lately. The ore bodies are being developed right along and it is estimated that there is now enough free gold ore in sight to run a 50-ton mill about five years. At the present time a tunnel is being pushed one the veln so as to secure a vertical doubt e bout if for the secure a vertical depth of about 115 feet. This tunnel can be run a distance of 5,000 feet on the wein if necessary. Besides this a crosscut is being worked which it is exbut is being worked which it is ex-pected will shortly tap two other veins of good ore running from \$7 to \$20 a ton. The completion of the present plans will more than double the present ore reserves which are blocked out and insure plenty of material for the new mill which it is proposed to build in the spring, to replace the little Huntington mill now in use. Mr. Mitchell, who is one of the owners of the prop-erty-P. T. Farnsworth being the oth-

er-said today that a 15-stamp mill will be built and installed with amalgamation tables and Frue vanners early this year at a cost of about \$20,000. Thirty men are at present employed in connection with the mine. Asked concerning the water supply Mr. Mitchell said although it is a dry country
