FOR SEPTEMBER.

Vital Statistics Show 73 Deaths, Five of Which Were Due to Old Age.

BIG BATCH OF NEW BABIES

Of Contagious Diseases Typhoid Fever Was Most Prevalent, There Being Sixty Seven Cases.

Clerk M. R. Brothers of the city board of health has completed his report for the month of September, showing the work done under the supervision of the health authorities. There were 73 deaths during the month, of which 39 svere males and 34 were females. Five of the deaths were due to old age. Twentyfour bodies were brought here for burial and 21 were shipped away for interment elsewhere. Of the total number of deaths 17 were non-residents.

The birth record shows a total of 149 births, of which 69 were males and 50 females, the latter being very much in the majority. During the month of August there were 158 births.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

There were 86 cases of contagious diseases reported to the board during the month, segregated as follows: Typhoid fever, 67; diphtheria, 8; smallpox, 4; chickenpox, 4; scarlet fever, 2; whooping cough, 1. Twenty-thres houses, consisting of 118 rooms were fumigated during the month.

The food inspector tested \$4 samples of milk and found all to be up to the standard required. He also made the following inspections: Commission houses, 121; groceries, 99; restaurants, 90; meatmarkets, 69; fish markets, 69; bakeries, 47; hotels, 36; dairies, 28; slaughter houses, 2; breweries, 1; hog ranches, 1.

SANITARY WORK.

A total of 2,900 inspectious were made during the month by the sanitary in-spectors of the health department. There were 478 cesspools and greastraps cleaned, 93 notices to connect with the sewer served and 24 sewer onnections made.

At the crematory 1.623 pounds of con-demned food was disposed of, also 225 loads of garbage, three loads of swill, 26 horses, 49 dogs, six hogs, four cows, and five cats. There were 3.000 loads of rubbish dumped at the city dump-ing ground during the month.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK.

The report of the city board of health for the week ending Oct. 7 shows 28 births: 15 makes and nine females. There were 31 deaths: 17 males and 14 females. Sixueen cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week, consisting of 11 cases of typhobil fever, two of diphtheria, one of measles and two of tuberculosis.
