WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

Salt Lake City, Utah,
September 14, 1897.

The past week has been generally favorable to the growing crops, though in a few districts high winds did some damage, and Meadowville and Peoa killing frosts occurred.

The forepart of the week was characterized by extremely dry, hot days and cool nights, while moderate showers, fairly well distributed over the State, windy and cooler weather was the rule the latter part of the week.

Beet digging is progressing nicely and corn cutting is well under way. Threshing continues active, and in some sections the threshing of small grain is almost completed. Sowing of onion seed has commenced. The potato crop is being marketed by the car load with fair returns.

BEAVER COUNTY.

Minersville—The past week has been favorable for all kinds of farm work; threshing is over and farmers are busy cutting and hauling corn; no frost here up to date.

BOXELDER COUNTY.

Brigham City—Warm days and cool nights; southerly winds in daytime, changing to brisk easterly winds at night; on the night of the 11th, rain amounting to .13 of an inch; corn is being cut.

Snowville—Weather cooler; light frost on the 8th and 9th; second crop of lucern about all in the stack; crop very light; potatoes about an average crop.

Geneva—Weather much colder part of the week; farmers threshing, grain not turning out as good as last year.

CACHE COUNTY.

Logan—Harvesting about over; threshing in full blast; frost on the 9th.

Paradise—Grain all cut and being stacked; threshing commenced; wheat better than was expected earlier in the season; third crop of lucern growing nicely where watered; light frost during week but no damage; some rain during week.

DAVIS COUNTY.

Kaysville—The past week has been very windy, destroying a great part of the fruit; fall grain seeding commenced, but the land needs rain to soften the ground to admit the seed, acreage will be above the average.

EMERY COUNTY.

Lawrence—The first part of the week was warm and dry; thunder and rain at intervals all day Friday; harvest drags along slowly; many fields of late oats, sown the latter part of June, yet green, but will ripen; we have the most beautiful fall weather in this county.

GARFIELD COUNTY.

Tropic—Past week windy with some rain; no frost yet, but the nights are very cool.

KANE COUNTY.

Johnson—Weather during the forepart of the week was very dry; latter part showery. Apples, peaches and plums ripe; started to cut corn; vegetables looking well.

MILLARD COUNTY.

Scipio—Very windy 7th and 8th; frost night of 8th; corn, vines, etc., killed; threshing commenced; rain on 10th, amounting to .10 of an inch.

Deseret—Windy and dusty the past week; light frost morning of 9th, doing but little damage; high winds did much damage to young shade trees

by breaking the limbs; no rainfall; roads very dry and cut up.

Meadow—Weather still dry and hot; a sprinkle of rain, not enough to lay the dust; grain all harvested and most of it threshed; yield fairly good, but barely an average crop; second crop of lucern all in; crop light; no rain in the valley.

PIUTE COUNTY.

Circleville—Second crop of lucern about all in the stack; the wind has set back the hauling and stacking of hay; otherwise the hay is in good shape and a much heavier crop than the first; garden truck is maturing well; some corn being cut; plenty of water.

RICH COUNTY.

Meadowville—The past week has been very favorable to harvesting, which is nearly finished; threshing of winter wheat going on; crop very light; heavy frost on the night of the 8th, killing all green vegetation.

SAN JUAN COUNTY.

Monticello—Heavy grain crops; alfalfa all in; no second crop to speak of; about 600 tons raised this season in this section; light rains; gardens look well; range good.

SALT LAKE COUNTY.

Mill Creek—Past week nights cooler but still dry; threshing all done and corn harvesting in progress; third crop of lucern ready to cut, but will be light crop.

SUMMIT COUNTY.

Peoa—Warm, bright weather on the 5th, 6th and 7th; cold wind on the 8th; killing frost on the 9th which did much damage; cold wind on 10th with light sprinkling of rain; cold wind on 11th and partly cloudy; harvesting of grain still on, also the cutting of the second crop of lucern which was slightly damaged by frost; potatoes and other tender plants killed by frost.

Oakley—The past week has been favorable to the growing crops; wheat harvest in full blast; potatoes not very good.

Coalville—High winds all the week with heavy rain on night of 11th; frost night of 10th made potatoes vines black.

SANPETE COUNTY.

Fairview—Grain crop nearly all harvesting and threshing has begun; the wheat yield will be fair; potatoes will give the average yield on account of early frost, etc.; weather the past week has been cloudy with occasional showers and a heavy rainstorm Saturday afternoon and night.

Chester—Grain stacked in good shape though some out yet; the hum of the threshers heard, and in this place a good plump kernel, and a steady 85 cents per bushel is advertised; a delightful rain retarding some; some fields yield thirty bushels to the acre.

TOOELE COUNTY.

Tooele—Another week of disagreeable high winds, stripping corn and fruit and preventing fall sowing; corn started to be cut; everything drying up.

Ibapah—Still very dry; warm in the day but cool and frost occasionally at night but not hard enough yet to do much damage; very high southwesterly winds now for two days; harvest pretty well along and the second crop of hay nearly all in; other farm work progressing nicely.

UTAH COUNTY.

Payson—Fine weather and coal nights. Had the first frost on the 8th; farmers digging sugar beets and hauling corn and wood; preparing for early winter. Rain on the 11th.

Lake Shore—The threshing season is half over with. Lucern seed is blighted and not very good this year; corn is ripe, sugar beets will soon be

ready to dig; potatoes doing well. The weather has been cooler with heavy winds.

American Fork—We have had a changeable week; very hot the forepart and quite cool the latter part with a sprinkling of rain. High winds did considerable damage to fruit.

Lehi—Beet digging commenced; crop one-half to two-thirds of last year. Thundershowers on 10th and 11th.

Salem—The small grain is all thrashed and the yield is fairly good. The weather has been very good for fruit drying, and many are engaged in this kind of work. The corn and potatoes are good. The melon crop (for which Salem is noted) is good.

WAYNE COUNTY.

Loa—Warm and beautiful weather. Half of our second crop of lucern cut but not hauled; wheat about all cut; crop light; good shower on 10th.

Teasdale—Weather past week has been warm and favorable for the ripening crops. Grain about all cut and most of the hay; some fruit ripe.

Notom—Hot and dry forepart of week; latter part windy and cooler. Melons ripe; tomatoes good crop; garden doing nicely.

WASHINGTON COUNTY.

St. George—Third crop of alfalfa mostly completed. Fruit drying progressing satisfactorily; sowing of onion seed going on. Windy afternoon of 5th, strong wind afternoon of 6th; very slight sprinkle of rain 2 p.m. 7th.

WEBER COUNTY.

Harrisville—Threshing finished; corn cutting commenced with fair crop; high winds detrimental to fruit; water plentiful; potatoes being marketed by the carloads with fair returns.

JUAB COUNTY.

Levan—A windy, blustering week with showers during the latter part which interfered to some extent with threshing operations; still most of the wheat stacks have disappeared. Farmers busy cutting and hauling corn for fear of frost. The ground in the orchards is literally covered with wind-fallen fruit. Rainfall for week .42 of an inch.

WILD ASSAULT ON DIAZ.

City of Mexico, Sept. 16.—Ignacia Anulfo, a violent character, assaulted President Diaz today during the military procession usual on Independence day. The man was felled with a cane by a companion of the president and was immediately taken into custody by the authorities.

The central thoroughfare of this city, extending from the great plaza to the Alameda or public park, and known by various names, was thronged by great numbers of people, assembled to see the military processions. Gens-d'armes on each side of the street kept the crowd from pressing the marchers on the way to take part in the public exercises at the Alameda, after which the military parade was to march through the same street on its way to the national palace, to be reviewed by President Diaz. The scene was immensely picturesque, the historic avenue, called by George Augustus Sala one of the famous streets of the world, being all aglow with color and the Spanish-fashioned balconies filled with ladies in brilliant toilettes.

After a short wait the murmur ran through the crowd that the president was coming, and on foot, dressed in the uniform of a general of division, the president, bowing right and left to the applauding crowds, came, immediately behind him being Gen. Pradillo, the governor of the national pal-
