LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

High Council. — The members of the High Council of this State will meet in the Council House on Friday, June 23, 1882, at 7 p. m. W. W. TAYLOR, Clerk.

A Good Periodical. — We have received No. 4 of *Mormonism*, a periodical published in the Danish language which is very highly recommended by parties who are its contributors.

Going Ahead. — The Oregon Short Line Railroad is completed between Pocatello, where it joins the Utah and Northern, and American Falls. Trains are running regularly between these two points.

Change of Occupation. — G. C. Wilcox, the occupational pedestrian, who was in the walking match in this city, is now a brakeman on the Utah and Northern R. R., and running between Spring Hill and Pocatello.

Extending. — The well known real estate agent, S. P. Teasdel, is making in addition to his already extensive establishment by the erection of a large and commodious warehouse in the rear of his premises, on East Temple street.

High and Wide. — A huge board walk, about sixteen feet high, has been erected on the corner opposite the Continental Hotel, to the north. Its purpose is to bulletin John Robb's great show, announced for next month.

Chilly. — We observe at the several newspapers the placard "Strawberries and Ice Cream." The strawberries are all O. K., but the ice cream "needs to be boiled," as Andy said, on such cool days as these, consequent upon the recent rains.

Benefit Entertainment. — To-morrow night, at the Walker Opera house, there will be an entertainment for the benefit of the "Bismarck Hospital." It will consist of musical and commencement exercises of the pupils of St. Mary's academy.

Slughter House. — Messrs. J. H. and J. W. Spivey have purchased the old slaughter house property, a short distance north of the Hot Springs. It will have a very large refrigerator and other conveniences in addition, so as to transform the place into the best slaughter house in the territory. The situation of the premises is eligible for the purpose.

Ready House. — The 18th Ward meeting house is nearly ready for occupation. The seats are all made and the painters are at work. Meetings will probably be held in the building for a week. The interior is of a neat and handsome appearance, and is of any other building of similar size in the city. The construction has, from the beginning, been under the supervision and management of the undersigned, Robert Patrick.

Salt Lake Valley and the Railroad. — We are assured, from a reliable source, that the railroad from Montpelier to Salt Lake will be opened by July 15th, the O. S. & N. R. R. having contracted to ship the head of cattle from the latter place on the above date.

Good news for the residents of the city. Many industries that have been dormant will now be proceeding to give employment to the people generally. It will thus give an impetus and increased vitality to those industries already in existence. — *Star Lake Democrat*

A Local Question. — Chinese residents are increasing in this city. The swelling of the number of the Mongolian part of the population causes the future existence of the city to be a question of local character. The existence of the city is in the heart of the town assuming more and more the nature of a nuisance. It is not until what regulations they are put under, the refuse of these establishments cannot be disposed of without infesting the air, and increasing the ground with filth. It will be discovered before long that a Chinese quarter as remote as practicable from the more thickly populated part of the city will become a positively necessary sanitary measure. Any person who is not already convinced of the correctness of this view should sniff the impure atmosphere as he passes even the most cleanly washhouse in the city. Unless his factories are in a good condition he will need no further proof.

A Kindly Review. — The *Glasgow Times*, a journal whose circulation is said to be second only to the *London Times*, publishes a good natured summary of the elaborate discourse delivered by President Taylor at the last General Conference. It is entirely free from the slightest tinge of prejudice, being really favorable as well as kindly in spirit. The article concludes as follows: "Of course the object of President Taylor in quoting these official statistics, and in depicting the vast mass of falsehood which has from time to time been openly spoken or insinuated against the moral results and effects of Mormonism in the Territory of Utah, is referring to the bill which has been introduced into the House of Representatives dealing with the peculiar domestic institution of the Mormons. President Taylor asked the assembly he was addressing, more than 12,000 persons, what in the circumstances they were going to do whether in fact they were going to relief. That he said, would please their enemies. But they were not going to do anything of the kind. Although they had been shamefully lied upon, they would defend their position, property, and system in a peaceful and constitutional manner. The President made a great point here. 'I say in the name of God we will not do any such thing and let all Israel say Amen!' And the vast congregation responded 'Amen!' 'We will stand by our contracts,' said the President, 'and the Constitution will bear us out in it. You have' he added—no doubt with a genial twinkle in his eye—'contracted to be united with your wives in time and eternity, and it would not do for us to break a constitutional law, would it?'

A Money-Making Measure. — It will be seen by the dispatches that the House of Representatives of Congress has passed, by a vote of 110 to 10, a bill which imposes upon each person from any foreign part, not a citizen of the United States, landing from any steamship, a tax of 50 cents. In view of the immense immigration to this country the revenue that would be created by this bill, should it become law, would be enormous. It certainly looks like a straining of protective policy to extend it to the human race. This is encouraging immigration the wrong way about. As the revenue derived from this taxation would far exceed any expense of the Government inspection of immigrants and ships, the object of the measure is plainly to make money. It will make plethoric picking for office holders, at the expense of the poor who are flocking from the old countries to this to join in building it up, enhancing and developing its great resources. While the tax may be put upon the shipper it is bound to fall upon the passengers, in the shape of a proportionate increase of rates. The measure is far from magnanimous, and has probably grown out of a former attempt of the New York Legislature to pass a law imposing a tax on the same class of persons landing at that port, of one dollar a head. If we recollect aright the bill did pass that body but was vetoed by the Governor.

"North American Review." — In the *North American Review* for July, the leading article is a profound and sympathetic study of "Emerson as a Poet" by Edwin P. Whipple. In "Hydraulic Pressure in Wall Street," a writer who withholds his name, exposes many of the tricks and devices by means of which fictitious values are created, and the unwary lured daily to ruin. Desire Charney contributes the eleventh article in the series on "The Ruins of Central America," and records the crowning triumph of his exploring expedition, namely, the discovery of a great ruined city in the hitherto unexplored country of the Lacandones, Guatemala. There are two papers on the civil service question: one, "The Things Which Remain," by Gall Hamilton, who labors to relieve the civil service from the aspersions cast upon it on account of Gulliver's crime; the other, "The Business of Office-Seeking," by Richard Grant White, who forcibly portrays the moral life that comes from the perennial struggle for place. Finally Francis Marion Crawford, son of the eminent American sculptor, writes of "False Taste in Art," and indicates certain directions in which art culture might be developed under the conditions of life existing in the United States. The Review is for sale by bookstores and newsdealers generally.

Utah Statistics. — The census bulletin No. 232, shows as follows, in relation to Utah: Persons, 143,903; square miles, 82,190; families, 23,373; dwellings, 23,710; persons to a square mile, 1.75; families to a square mile, 0.23; dwelling to a square mile, 0.23; acres to a person, 385.38; acres to a family, 1,853.93; persons to a dwelling, 8.39; persons to a family, 5.07. Bulletin No. 233, shows as follows: Number of horses, 38,131; rate of increase 1879-1880 per cent., 248; number of mules and asses, 2,898; rate of increase, 1879-1880, per cent., 1; number of working oxen, 3,988; rate of increase, 14; mules, 32,768; rate of increase, 87; other cattle, 63,680; rate of increase, 224; sheep, 238,121; increase, 291; swine, 17,148; increase, 446.

Sam'l of Posen. — This play will be performed at the Walker Opera House on Saturday. The *New York Herald* says about it: "Sam'l of Posen" has made a palpable hit, and nightly attracts to Haverly's Fourteenth Street Theatre large houses, standing room at the theatre is in the auditorium. "A quarter" and a "half of a dollar" have become the phrases of the town.
