### LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

#### NOTICE TO SETTLERS.

All persons who contemplate moving to the settlements on the Little Colorado River and its tributaries, in the Territory of Arizona, should take along with them sufficient flour and other supplies to sustain them until crops can be raised. The grain raised in those new settlements during the past year is becoming scarce, in consequence of so many going to that country last fall and this winter, and depending on the settlers for their bread. Flour cannot be procured for anything but money, and must then be hauled from 250 to 320 miles.

**Priesthood Meeting.**—The regular monthly meeting of the Priesthood of the Stake will be held in the Fourteenth Ward Assembly Rooms, on Saturday, the 7th inst., at 11 a. m.

**Prisoners Escaped.**—A special train from Evanston, Wyoming, received last night, states that three prisoners named McBride, Ingersoll and Sloan, broke out of jail there last evening, and escaped. No particulars given.

**Temperance.**—Dr. McKenzie, the Boston temperance lecturer, has been tendered the free use of the Theatre, by President Taylor, for holding his revivals while in this city. The first lecture in that place will be delivered this evening.

**Off the Track.**—The Utah Southern passenger train was detained an hour and a half, at the Point of the Mountain, yesterday morning, through some of the cars jumping the track. The delay there, made a corresponding tardiness in the arrival of the up train last evening.

**Notice to Bookkeepers.**—All persons interested in the question of "foul brood," those desiring legislation and those opposed thereto, if any, are requested to meet with the Committee on Agriculture &c., of the House of Representatives, on Monday, Feb. 6th, 1890, at 10 a. m., at the City Hall. All prominent bee men should attend.

**Fast Day.**—To-day, being the first Thursday of the month, was observed as fast day, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. In most of the wards, meetings were held this forenoon. In the 18th Ward, 7 o'clock this evening is the hour appointed for holding meetings to enable those to attend who are so situated that they cannot leave their business during the day.

**Another Bereavement.**—We are sorry to learn of the death of the infant son of Brother William C. Spence, of the 17th Ward, which sad event occurred this morning at 10:30 o'clock. Just four weeks ago to-day the same parents were called upon to lose their oldest child, and now their last and only remaining darling, born the day after the other's death, has left them to join its little mate in the spirit world. The disease that took the little one to-day is called peritinitis, akin to inflammation of the bowels. The funeral will be held at the residence of the parents, to-morrow, at noon.

**"Eunuchs" Notes.**—We learn that Mr. McIntyre, of Tintic, has had about 600 head of cattle frozen to death, on this range in the Gilmore mountains, in the western part of Tintic valley.

Reports come from all parts of the country of stock dying from want and cold.

There are 27 cases of diphtheria reported at Wallburg, Wasatch county, among about 60 families. Such a fearful proportion being down with the contagion, naturally excites that usually quiet burg.

In Provo and vicinity the peaches and some other fruit buds are said to be killed with the frosty fogs which have been so prevalent lately. A loss of our stone fruit is always keenly felt by the people.

The missing Elliotts—that the Salt Lake papers intimate as having probably wandered into the mountains and been frozen to death, lately obtained about \$1,500 worth of cattle from two or three citizens of Spanish Fork on the "promise to pay" principle. As this occurred just prior to the sudden disappearance of Elliott, said citizens are naturally excited with "furling suspicions."

**Another Union.**—Yesterday afternoon, at half past 4 o'clock, another happy wedding was consummated, the parties to the sacred contract being Mr. Harry Field and Miss Clara Harrison, both of this city and well and favorably known in the community. The ceremony was performed by President D. H. Wells. The reception was held last evening at the residence of the bride's uncle, Judge E. D. Hoge, in the 11th Ward, where a throng of guests presented their smiling faces and congratulations. The newly married pair have an army of friends and well-wishers, with whom we earnestly join in expressing a hope that their future may be as happy and bright as their present is joyful and promising.

**District Court.**—Not much business was done this morning. The case of the Free Silver Mining Co. vs. George Norton, was argued before Chief Justice Hunter and submitted, while that of the People, et al. vs. George A. Jackson, indicted for assault, was tried before Judge Emerson, and given to the jury, who retired to find a verdict.

The only case disposed of yesterday afternoon was Thomas Slater vs. John B. Meredith; demurrer to complaint argued. Motion to strike out demurrer allowed; defendant excepts; ten days given to answer.

**A Needed Amendment.**—A bill was introduced in the House, yesterday afternoon, for an act to amend Section 1692 of the Compiled Laws of Utah, providing for the punishment of contempt. The amendment provides that persons shall only be adjudged guilty of contempt, when it is shown, by affidavit, that the act they refuse to perform, is within the bounds of possibility. It also limits the punishment by confinement to 30 days, or until the required act is performed. This will clip the claws of Messrs. Dodson and Fogg a little shorter.

**On the Trail.**—Mr. S. A. Kenner, editor of the Ogden Junction, came down to Salt Lake this morning, and will leave to-morrow on a trip through Southern Utah, combining pleasure with business during his travels. One of his chief amusements will be to follow up the man Harris, who has been defrauding the good people of the South, by representing himself as an agent of the Junction, and expose him in his true light. We wish Mr. Kenner success.

**Woman's Exponent.**—The February list number of this paper is out, and is one that will be read with interest by all. The contents in prose are "A Chapter for Young Married Folks," "Speech of Hon. C. W. Furness in the House of Representatives," (Woman Question—Utah Legislature), "Charlotte Bronte," "Aglitation is Educational" (editorial), and other good articles. The poetry is "Simple Justice—Woman's Right," and "The Loved and Lost."

**Home Geyser.**—That hot steam pipe that sprinkles benevolently on the heads of the passers by, may be "very successful and very excellent" for the boys in the Co-op. office and those who admire the phenomena of the geyser and water-spout, but for the boys in the street, who prefer rain with umbrellas and shower baths in summer time, distance is a necessary ingredient to the enjoyment such things might produce.

**Exonerated.**—In our notice the other evening, of the reason for the delay in the publication of the *Juvenile Instructor*, we stated that the paper for which that office is waiting was ordered in December, in stead of which, it was ordered in October, but expected in December. We state this, so that the patrons of the *Juvenile* may exonerate the publishers for the delay, and attribute it to the right cause.

**The bill to amend Sec. 72, Compiled Laws,** was unfavorably reported on by the committee, who recommended that it do not pass, as it would result in hardship to several counties. Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

The committee on counties returned a substitute for the bill to extend the boundaries of Davis County. Passed first reading.

A petition, signed by Chas. N. Smith and 104 others, residents of Kane County, praying for a new division of the counties of Kane and Washington, in case the county seat should be changed from Tropicville to Kanab, was received, read and referred.

The bill amending the act defining trespass and damage, was reported back with recommendations that it do not pass. Recommendations adopted.

The bill substituting for the one to extend the boundaries of Davis County, passed its second reading and amended slightly.

Three communications were received from the House, the first announcing the passage on Tuesday, of the bill to amend section 165, Compiled Laws; the second the passage of the bill amending chapter 4, title 11, Compiled Laws, and the third stating that the House had adopted the adverse report on the amending of section 532, Compiled Laws. The accompanying bills were read and the first referred to committee on counties the second to committee on incorporations.

The bill to equalize taxation on stock was reported back with recommendations that it be put upon its passage. Passed second reading. House announced the passage of the bill legalizing the execution and acknowledgment of certain deeds, with amendments. The latter were concurred in by the Council.

The bill substituted for the one to extend the boundaries of Davis County, passed its third reading and was sent to the House.

### HOUSE.

Wednesday, Feb. 4, 1890, 3 p. m. A bill to amend the act relating to contempt and punishments therefor, was read and referred to the committee on judiciary.

A Council message announced the passage, with amendments, of the railroad franchise bill. Amendment concurred in.

A bill to validate deeds made by private judges and notaries, was amended, and passed the House.

A message from the Council announced the reception of the House bill to amend section 72, relating to weights and measures.

H. F. 12, relating to changes in the number of trustees or directors of corporations, was reported back with a substitute, which was accepted and having been read the third time passed the House.

The report of the committee on printing, recommending that the financial reports of the various counties, now printed, be placed on the minutes of the Assembly, was adopted.

The petition of Eli Baird and 257 others, asking that the county seat of Kane County be removed from Tropicville to Kanab, and giving the reasons for the desired change, was referred to the appropriate committee.

A motion that rules be drafted to govern the House was lost.

The bill in relation to Guardian and Ward was reported back with recommendations for its passage. Reading postponed till Thursday.
