Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

Washington, June 28.—The Washington National Monument Society requests the churches and Sabbath schools of the country to take up a collection on Sunday, July 1st, to aid in the completion of the monument; contributions are to be forwarded to J. B. Smith, treasurer of the society, at Washington, D. C.

San Francisco, June 28.—The Attorney-General has decided the question of nationality and naturalization, submitted by the Department of State. The facts are: Mr. A. S. Sienkiewicz, a Russian by birth, immigrated to the U. S. in 1848, and was naturalized in St. Louis in 1854. When he returned to Germany he took his son, then four years old, born in the U. S. The son is now twenty years old. The question at issue arose as to the son owing military service to Germany. The Attorney-General comes to the conclusion that the boy has two nationalities, one natural and the other acquired. The father returning to Germany and resuming his allegiance, the son partakes of the status of the father, being a minor, and having enjoyed the protection of the German government for the time being, or till of age, he owes it military duty, the obligation being reciprocal. But when the boy becomes of age he can return to the U. S. as a citizen, with all the rights and privileges, as such, and would be eligible, even to the presidency of the U. S.

The President has recognized Giuseppe D. Montanucci, consul-agent of Italy at Memphis.

An Unauthorized Transfer.

Memphis, June 28.—W. B. Greenlaw, President of the Memphis and the Rock Railway, to-day issued an order to the officers and employees, notifying them that the road had passed into the hands of trustees, and designating R. K. Dow, of New Hampshire, as manager for the trustees, as custodian of all the property, and in charge of the running of the road.

Hugh Brinkley, vice-president, who owns two-thirds of the road, immediately applied for an injunction, which was granted, as neither Brinkley nor any other director had authorized the transfer of the management to Dow. Brinkley holds possession of the depot and office here, and will continue to do so unless the injunction is dissolved.

Heavy Loss by Fire.

PATERSON, N. J., June 28.—The Watson Bridge Works are in flames at this hour, 1 a.m. The water supply seems to be failing, and there is little hope of saving any of the buildings. The works were running night and day on a new iron port bridge for the Erie railway; 400 or 500 men are employed. Insured \$100,000. The loss is already twice that sum. The third floor has been used as a silk factory, and the loss to that trade is \$25,000. Insured. Charles N. Martin, of N. Y., silk makers, loss \$10,000.

Indicted for Embezzlement.

CINCINNATI, June 28.—A grand jury, today, returned indictments against Thos. E. Buell Baker, the present chief of police, formerly secretary of the water works, Wm. Mark, city editor of the Post-Enquirer, and collector of the water rents, J. B. McCormick, ex-collector of the water rents, and Paul Reimann, a former trustee of the water works, for embezzlement of the board of trustees of the Longview Lumber Company, for the embezzlement of money belonging to the water works, and for the embezzlement of one of the present trustees of the water works, for grand larceny. These cases have all been brought to light by the action taken by the management of the water works, which has been in progress some weeks past, and is now nearly completed.

More Indictments Found.

NEW YORK, June 28.—Six new indictments were returned against Wm. M. Tweed, Peter B. Sweeney, Woodward and others, for obtaining money from the city treasury on a false pretense. The amount involved is \$90,000.

Another Terrible.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., June 28.—A terrible tornado, sweeping over Woodbine, killed and injured many persons, and destroyed many buildings. The tornado was very violent, and the damage done was very great. Two children were killed and fifteen persons severely hurt. 23 cottages were destroyed, and many others damaged. The part of the city visited by the tornado was sparsely settled, and the loss of life would doubtless have been much greater. A citizens' meeting for the relief of the sufferers is called for Wednesday.

The Most-Disaster Marriage Case.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 28.—In the case of the State vs. R. R. Dow, and State vs. J. B. Smith, the court has decided the question of the validity of the union if only a license has been taken out, and an agreement has been entered into in the presence of any person that they will become man and wife. It was not necessary in the case in hand that the duration of the union should be stipulated as the law itself determines this. This marriage is especially binding, as both the parties have testified that they believed it was legal when consented to, and that it should be delivered from each other by mutual willingness, but that they testified that he knew it could only be separated by a decree

of the court, that this clause was only meant as a protest against the existing laws.

Moreover this was signed after the parties had pronounced themselves married, therefore the clause can not be construed as invalidating a general agreement to become husband and wife. This is the language used—"Whereas, the courts of law have decided that marriage is a civil contract, and governed by the same rules as all other contracts, therefore we hereby agree that this contract exist and be in force during our physical lives provided that our mutual love natures ever blend as now; but to terminate without prejudice by the wish of either party if love shall ever cease to be mutual, the event we trust and believe never will occur." Their compact showed rather ignorance of some points of law than an idea of violating them. In most of the States the courts have decided in the same way that this marriage would, under the circumstances, be binding until death of a competent court should dissolve the contract.

Six Persons Drowned.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 28.—Six persons, all colored, while rowing in a skiff on Hell's Lake near here last evening, were drowned by the capsizing of the boat. There was one man and five women in the party.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Business in the Commons—Another Failure.

LONDON, June 28.—In the House of Commons, to-day, the bill amending the labor laws passed its second reading, and the national debt sinking fund bill was read the 3rd time.

Edmund Jones & Co., East India merchants, and agents of the Birmah government, have failed; their liabilities are estimated at £750,000.

IRELAND.

The Great Rifle Match.

DUBLIN, June 28.—It has been finally decided that the Irish Rifle Match should consist of the following: Dr. J. R. Hamilton, Mr. Pollock, Jno. McKenna, J. K. Miller, Mr. Wilson and Edmund Johnson, all to shoot with the Right rifle, while the Americans, Fulton, Bodine, Dakin, and Coleman use the Remington, and Coleman and Hulse use the Sharp's rifle. The match will begin at 11 to-morrow a.m. Absolute silence will be maintained during the match. No conversation will be permitted even among the shooters. Neither team will be allowed to know the number of the other team's shots until the end of the firing at each range, when the scores will be officially announced. A large number of Americans have already arrived in Dublin to witness the match.

FRANCE.

Holder for the Bullion, etc.

PARIS, June 28.—The Assembly, to-day, voted 998,000 francs for the relief of the sufferers by the inundation. It was resolved that a subscription should be opened among the members of the Assembly.

The Committee of Thirty has decided that the Chamber of Deputies shall be renewed every four years.

SPAIN.

Bombarded a Big Fire.

MADRID, June 28.—The Spanish fleet on the northern coast has bombarded the Carlist posts of Berme and Modica.

A conflagration at Valencia, in the province of Seville, yesterday, destroyed 140 buildings.
