### CALIFORNIA OIL.

#### Claim Made that State Has Texas Outdone.

According to the figures of Dr. C. T According to the figures of D. C. T. Deane, secretary of the California Pe-troletim Miners' association, the oil production of California for the year 1905 was 35,671,000 barrels, and exceeded that of the previous year by 7.194975 barrels. This clearly places California in the first rank among the oil-produc-tion states, which was recently claumed ing states, which was recently claimed by Texas, whose production for 1965 was given as 30,354,264 barrels.

Seventy-five per cent of the fuel used in California, says the Oil City Derrick, in commenting on these figures, is supplied from the oil wells. Nearly all the vessels in San Francisco bay use the vessels in San Francisco bay use oil for steam purposes and occan steam-ers are employing it with satisfactory results. Oil fuel is rapidly surpassing British Columbia coal in Oregon and Washington and its superiority for purposes of this kind has been recog-nized with 50 miles of some of the greatest coal mines in the English do-mintons. minions.

The sugar refiners of the Hawalian Islands are substituting oil for coal as rapidly as they can and enterprising companies are pushing the fuel oll trade into the countries along the west-ern coast of South America. There is no limit to the markets and the Call-fornia producers are looking forward another prospeous year in this industy.
