scattered bands of conspirators. The assassination of the king and The assassination of the king and queen of Servia belongs in a different tategory. To find an exact parallel in a civilized country one must go back to the declining years of the Roman empire, when, as in Servia, it was the army which dethroned and murdered the rulers who had gained the hatred of their people. Later parallels in semi-civilized countriles are the murders of Abdul-Aziz in the Turkey of the nine-ticenth century and of Peter III in the Russia of the eighteenth. These acts of violence had a definite object in view. They wrought a revolution. They ac-complished - they changed the history They wrought a revolution. They ac-complished-they changed the history of the world.

FOUNDED BY BLOOD.

The empire of Rome may be said to have been founded in blood. The as-massimation of Julius Caesar, the defeat of his enemies, Brutus, Cassius and their co-conspirators, and the dissen-sions between his friends Antony and Octavius, culminated in the establish-ment of the latter as Augustus Caesar.

Augustus died peacefully. But the story of the long line of Caesars who followed him is largely written in blood

His five immediate successors, Tiberius, Caligula, Claudius, Nero and Galba, came to violent ends. At staccato intervals thereafter the Praetorian Guards, who eventually became the real masters of Rome, rose against their nominal master, murdered him and bargained off the empire to a successor who was constantly in danger of a similar fate.

At last the line which began with one Augustus, terminated in another whose insignificance was indicated by the con-temptuous diminutive of Augustulus and further emphasized when he was dismissed into pensioned obscurity instead of being condemned to penal immortality

LINES OF TRAGEDY.

The story of the Romanoffs, dating from 1613, when Michael, the first of the line, was crowned czar of Russia, has been almost as full of tragedy as that of the Caesars. Peter the Great at the tender age of 10, escaped assassination only through his mother's heroism. Princess Sophia, his half sister, had determined that her own idiot brother, Ivan, should succeed to the throne. In pursuance of this object she saked the palace of Peter's maternal ancestors, but he and his mother, Natalia, found refuge in a sanctuary. Thither they were followed by a band of sacriligious foldiers. One of them had actually frawn his sword upon the child when Natalia sprang forward and imperious-y demanded how he dared kill his tsar. The soldier qualled and hesitated. That moment of hesitation gaved Peter's life. The sound of approaching horse-men was heard outside. The soldiers turned and fied.

Peter had a great revenge upon So-phia when he came to the throne. He had her beautiful hair shaved clean tway from her skull and confined her in a convent. Three conspirators com-nunicated a plan of rescue to her. The etter was intercepted by Poter's spies. The three conspirators were seized and of the corpses, the letter was thrus into its stiffened fingers and the hide-bus trophy was hung in Sophia's bedfoom. Inured as she was to scenes of blood, this proved too much even for here iron nerves. Before the flesh had otted from the bones she herself was in her grave. After Sophia's death Peter's hate con-centrated itself on his own son, Alexis. He forced him into an unwilling mar-jage and later accused him of beating the unloved wife. The charge may have been true. But Peter was hardly the been true, but Peter was hardly the man to bring it. He was wont to exer-sise his own husbandly and imperial authority by beating his successive tarritzes and the ladies of the court, to say nothing of kicking his generals lownstairs. Alexis deemed it best to fee from Russia. Peter lured him back with promises, trumped up fresh charges against him, threw him into a dunseen, and then had him quietly and un-sstentationsly polsoned. Years after-ward an officer of Peter's court di-vulged the secret.

A conspiracy, head-er by Catherine's admirer, Alexis Or-loff, was formed among the nobles. Peter was dethroned and cast into pris-on. His wife was proclaimed as Cath-erine II. She promptly dispatched Or-loff to poison her husband. Peter de-tected the drug in a glass of wine that Orloff had given him. Refusing to drink a second glass, Orloff strangled him on July 17, 1762.

him on July 17, 1762. Catherine's son and successor, Paul JII, was a dangerous maniae. Again the nobles of the palace conspired against their tsar. They forced an entrace to his bedroom, found that he had flown, followed him to his refuge, pinned him to the floor, and while one of the Zu-boffs broke his arms with a club others ran his body through with their swords. Finally he was strangled Finally he was strangled.

MURDER NO MORE.

Since that time the Romanoffs have Since that time the Romanoffs have refrained from assassinating members of their own family. Outsiders took up the job they had relinquished. Repeat-ed attempts were made upon the life of Alexander II, the present tsar's grand-father. He was shot at in Paris in 1867; he was shot at in his own capital in 1879. In the latter year a train in which he was supposed to be traveling was blown up by an elaborate mine beneath the railroad track. In 1880 a destructive explosion by dynamite occurred in the explosion by dynamite occurred in the imperial apartments in the Winter pal-ace at St. Petersburg. Once more the tsar was absent. Early in the next year the world was shocked by the news that the Nhillists had succeeded in their plots, and that Alexander II was dead. He had been assassinated by the ex-He had been assassinated by the ex-plosion of a bomb while driving from the parade to the Winter palace, on Sunday, March 13, 1881, Grenevitsky, the man who threw the fatal bomb, was killed in the explosion, but several of his fellow conspirators were arrested and put to death or sent to Siberia.

PLOTS THAT FAILED.

It is remarkable how many attempted assassinations have failed, even when they have been planned by expert and resolute men. The two Napoleons, un-cle and nephew, were many times saved by what seemed the direct interposition of Providence. As early as 1800 Damer-ville and 24 of his accomplices were arrested the day before the execution of their well planned plot to kill the first consul. In the same year a bomb burst in the Rue Nivaise 50 seconds before Bonaparte was expected to pass the

Napoleon of-fered Slaby a pardon, which he refused, saying that he would never rest until he had accomplished his object. Napoleon III escaped almost miracu-lously from the knife of Greppo, the re-volver of Planeri and the bombs of Or-sini. Planeri's attempt was made in the actually selzed the bridle of 1857. He actually seized the bridle of the emperor's horse, in the Champ the emperor's norse, in the Champ Elysees, despite the presence of a con-stant bodyguard of innumerable police agents in citizens' clothes, and fired a pistol in Napoleon's face. shots in Europe. Orsini's attempt and its failure recall the failure of a similar attempt which Fieschi planned against Louis Philippe in 1835. The king, followed by his sons and a brilliant staff, was reviewing the troops on the boulevards when a loud report shook the houses, and immediately the ground around him was strewn with dead and wounded, among

them Marshai Mortier, Duc de Trevise. The king and his sons were unhurt. Fleschi was arrested in the little yard of an adjoining house, whence he fired a succession of rifle shots through the blinds of the third story. He was taken, tried, sontenced and executed, with his accomplices Another striking instance was presented by young Blind's attempt upon the life of Prince Blsmarck. Blind was

an experi marksman-he had won the Wimbleton cup-yet, though he dis-charged the six chambers of his revolver while grapping with the German chancellor, none of them took effect. In short, up to a half century ago it seemed as if rulers and potentates were under the apecial protection of Provi-dence and bore a charmed life against bombs, bullets and daggers.

EXTRAORDINARY CASES. With the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, on April 14, 1865, there began an extraordinary series of successful assassinations, which have progressed at almost a geometrical ratio up to

at almost a geometrical ratio up to our day. Michael, prince of Servia, was mor-tally wounded on June 10, 1868; Marshal Prim of Spain, on Dec. 28, 1870; George Danboy, archbishop of Paris (by the Communists) on May 24, 1871; the Earl of Mayo, governor general of India, on Feb. 8, 1872; Sultan Abdul-Aziz, on June 4, 1876; President Garfield at Washington, on July 2, 1881; Lord Fred-erick Cavendish and T. H. Burke, in Phoenix park, Dublin, on May 6, 1882; President Carnot of France, at Lyons, in 1894; Stetan Stambuloff, in Sofia, Bulgarla, in 1895; Empress Elizabeth of Anstria, at Geneva in 1895; King Hum-bert of Italy, at Monza, in 1900, and President McKinley, at Buffalo, N. Huge Railroad Home of Which Chicago is Particularly Proud -Built by the Rock Island and Located on the Famous Elevated Loop.



The La Salle Street depot of the Rock Island system is now ready for operation and needless to say not only is the railroad company considerably elated over the completion of the structure, but Chicigoans themselves point with pride to the huge building which is numbered among the largest railroad depots in the world. In connection with this huge deput the slogan, "in the heart of Chicago," is very appropriately identified with the terminal which is most conveniently located and is the only railroad depot in Chicago which is on the elevated loop. All elevated trains pass and stop at its doors and are reached from the train floors without the necessity of descending to the street.

Aside from the size and importance of the building itself, the erection of the new station for the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern and the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Rallways on Van Buren Street, Chicago, has been of great interest because of the dispatch with which the work has been carried on. The specifications of the station were placed in the hands of the contractors in the fall of 1901. The original plans called for an eight-story office structure to occupy a frontage of 215 feet on Van Buren styre, and to extend south 157 feet, beyond which the concourse and trainshed w The built to Harrison street, a distance of 625 feet. The original plan changed somewhat, the office building now being 12 stories high.
