New York, July 21.—The excursion steamer Sirius was deliberately run aground off North Brother island today to avoid a panic among her 1,000 passengers, and a possible repetition of the Slocum disaster. The Sirius, carrying a Sunday school picnic party, stove in her side on a rock, near the very spot where the Slocum burned last year. Although Capt. Pearce did not believe the ship would sink, he ran her aground with all possible dispatch and emptied the crew into the docks with the aid of small boats. Another boat took the excursionists to their picnic grounds, and tugs were sent to the disabled Sirius.
