The impression still prevails at Wash-ington that Minister Sickles has instructions relative to Cuba, which will direct him in dealing with the Spanish Court officials.

R. D. Bogart, the alleged defaulting paymaster's clerk, who is charged with the embezzlement of \$12,000 in Governa ment bonds, from the paymaster of the receiving ship Vermont, at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, who was arrested in Texas after a long pursuit, was discharged from the custody of the Marshal yesterday, and turned over to the naval authorities to be tried by court martial.

Libels have been filed in the United States District Courts at Brooklyn, by the owners of the steamers H. M. Cool, R. H. Mahey and Jonathan Chase,

against Ignatio Alfarand, of the Cuban Junta, for the payment of \$38,000 for the use of these boats for an excursion around the waters of New York.

It is stated that there is information at the Treasury Department that the counterfeiting of U.S. securities in some European countries is being carried on to some extent.

Washington. - The enforcement of the revenue laws, in at least a portion of the State of Georgia, appears to be a matter of some difficulty, if not danger. Three gentlemen have declined the appointment as Assessors in one district, and have abandoned the field to disor derly parties. The district complained of is known as the third Georgia District, comprising 23 counties in the central and eastern part of the State. Col-lector Beecher has forwarded to Commissioner Delano his last appointee, Wm. E. Haycord, with a statement that he found it impossible to discharge his duties, owing to threats of intimidation and actual violence. Three unsuccessful attempts had been made to assess property in these counties. The matter will be brought to the attention of the President on his return, and if necessary, the military will be used to enforce the law.

Brother Winters of that place has a nursery of 30,000 budded apple trees. At Provo City he saw one "stool" of barley exhibited, containing 101 heads, averaging eighty grains to the head, all the product of one grain of seed. There was also a bunch of Norway oats exhibited, six feet six inches high. He visited the garden of Bro. Daniel Graves, of Provo, and saw there one vine, a seedling from the Isabella, containing 150 pounds of grapes; his total yield of grapes this sea-son will be about 3,500 pounds. He also saw a garden in Springville, owned by Brother Childs, from which fifty bushels of English gooseberries have been gathered trees. Havana.-The volunteers from Remedios surprised a force of rebels at Sa-quna and killed eighteen. Advices from San Espiritu state that two hundred troops had captured the rebel entrenchments with considerable

loss on both sides. A force of 1,800 rebels attacked the
