

GRAND JURY HAS PARTIAL REPORT

Conditions in County and City Jails and at the Infirmary Are Commented Upon.

BINGHAM NEEDS A SEWER.

Present Unsanitary Methods Are a Menace to the Community's Health, Declare Jurymen.

The special grand jury made partial report to Judge George G. Armstrong in the criminal court room in the city and county building Saturday afternoon.

The report of the jury has to do with county and city jails, prisons and infirmaries. The conditions in the county jail in this city and the city jail are reported as excellent, though additional space is recommended at the county jail that prisoners may not be confined there in a cell.

STATE PRISON WELL KEPT.

The state prison is modern and very well kept. The health of the prisoners as shown by the hospital records, is much better than it would be with many persons outside pursuing the ordinary vocations.

The Salt Lake county jail is nearly 20 years old, but modern plumbing has recently been installed, and the whole structure is well kept. It is not large enough for the present needs and another room should be added.

The Salt Lake City jail is new and modern. The inside of the building needs paint and some repairs to the plumbing and other apparatus.

The prisoners at these three institutions make no complaint as to the food they are furnished, and upon investigation we find the meals are clean and well suited to men closely confined a large part of the time.

PRISONERS SHOULD BE SEPARATE.

In the Salt Lake county and the Salt Lake City jails prisoners should be placed in a separate cell. If this is done less immorality will result from such confinement than necessarily follows when two men are confined in the same cell.

MURRAY JAIL UNCLEAN.

The Murray city jail is the old county jail at that point and is being used by the city while the new jail is being built. It is not kept clean.

The Bingham town jail is a disgrace to any civilized community. It is filthy, unwholesome and filled with vermin.

AT COUNTY INFIRMARY.

We have devoted considerable time to the county infirmary, talking with the inmates and going through the books of accounts. The women's building is new, thoroughly clean, well ventilated and homelike.

We have been through the books of accounts kept at the institution and find them as straight and that the buying is economically done. The flour, cost of which amounts to about \$70 a month, and the meat, cost of which amounts to about \$75 a month, should be purchased after advertisement and competitive bidding.

SOME INMATES DEMENTED.

There are several demented persons among the inmates. The feet of their presence upon the old folks whose only fault is their poverty is distressing.

The salaries of the attendants at the institution are ridiculously low. There is no wonder that it is difficult to keep them. The matron who has constant care of the domestic affairs of the institution and of the private affairs of the old folks receives \$10 a month.
