LONDON, 30.-The Queen has replied to the memorial of the peace society, praying for the commutation of the death sentence recently passed by the Canadian court on Lewis Riel. Her Majesty replied that she was unable to interfere in the case without first consulting her responsible advisers. Col. F. A. Stanley, the colonial secretary states that the Queen has delegated he pardoning power to Marquis Lansdowne, Governor General of Canada, who is at present inquiring into the matter, and that it is impossible for the home government to interfere in Riel's behalf.
